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FOREWORD BY CHAIRPERSON



Preamble

I have the pleasure of presenting to you the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) annual report for the financial year 2020/2021, in compliance with Section 38 (1) of the BNSC Act No. 30 of 2014.

The period under review marked the first full financial year for the current Board; having been appointed in the middle of the 2019/2020 fiscal year; precisely in December 2019.

No doubt, the period April 2020 to March 2021 was the most challenging for Botswana sport in a very long time. It was during that time that we sadly lost some of our sport icons and legends. May the souls of all our departed colleagues in sport continue to rest in eternal peace and may their legacies live forever.

As if that was not enough, it was during the same period that we saw serious restrictions being imposed to amongst other areas, international travel, movement of people in Botswana and public gatherings; including sport activities being completely banned for a sizeable part of that period, all on account of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Sport was as result very adversely affected; with some sport associations barely having activities, a situation that was not helped by the limited ability of National Sport Associations (NSAs) and/or clubs to generate funds the way they usually did in the past as well as the recall of some funds previously voted to sport by Government; with a view to use such funds and others to fight the scourge of Covid-19.

Not withstanding the many challenges we were confronted with during 2020/2021, it was important that life had to continue at the Commission, for anything less than that would have been tantamount to conceding defeat and in the process, thwarting the dreams and ambitions of many Batswana; young and old, with or without disabilities who look up to the Commission to provide the necessary environment for them to practice sport and nurture their talents.

The purpose of this report therefore is to highlight the ways through which the Commission supported NSAs and other stakeholders, to not only navigate COVID-19 but also make possible the practice of sport by all Batswana, the nurturing of talent and indeed the quest to take the necessary steps towards the goals set out in our Vision 2028. The report also talks to some of the key challenges encountered during the year under review as well as the successes achieved.

COMPOSITION OF THE BOARD

The BNSC Board consists of eleven (11) members who are, subject to any special or general directions of the Minister, responsible for the overall direction of the affairs of the Commission, and for such other matters as may be specified in the BNSC Act. Members are appointed by the Minster responsible for Sport and all appointments to the Board are signified by notice in the Government Gazette.

Of the eleven 11 members appointed, the Minister designates one to be the Chairperson of the Board, normally for a term of four (4) years A member whose term of office has expired shall be eligible for re-appointment or re-election, as the case may be, as a member.

For the reporting period, the Board was fully constituted until Mr. Tuelo Daniel Serufho; hitherto Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNSC) Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and BNSC Board Member took over the reigns at BNSC as a Caretaker CEO in October 2020.

The Human Resource Committee: was charged with ensuring adherence to good labour and corporate practices with respect to employeremployee relationship from a strategic perspective.

Sport Development Committee: was tasked with advising the Board on matters of sport development, including programme and projects at the Commission and the National Sport Associations.

Equity & Recreation: had the role of appraising and informing the board on matters of recreation sport and equity.

International Games & Events Hosting Committee: had the responsibility of advising the Board on matters of hosting of sport events and participation at international events.

Strategy and Compliance Committee: was entrusted with ensuring that policies and procedures of the Commission where adhered to as well as advising the Board on governance and strategy development, implementation as well as monitoring and evaluation.

Meetings of The Board and Board Committees

As per the dictates of the BNSC Act, the Board and its Committees met at least once per guarter and in some instances, as frequently as circumstances dictated, to discuss and/or make resolution on issues of strategy, policy and/or those that could only be approved at that level.

Owing to restrictions that were given rise to by Covid-19, the majority of the Board and Board Committee meetings were held through through virtual platforms; something that presented both opportunities and risks to the Commission; with effort being put into mitigating the risks.

Corporate Governance

The Commission continued to be guided by the principles of the King III Code; the hitherto adopted Code for the Commission as well as the guidance of other oversight entities such as the Botswana Accountancy Oversight Authority.

The 2020/2021 annual report is Commission's position and/or performance of relevant King III principles, of which the Board is satisfied that it has fulfilled its responsibilities in accordance with its Charter.

Ethical Leadership

Board deliberations, decisions and actions continued to be based on the Commission's principles and ethics, with due consideration to the effects of the same on the environment and societies within which we operate amongst other things.

The made a commitment to upholding the highest ethical and other standards through signing the Board Charter at the beginning of the reporting period.

Corporate Social Responsibility

In line with its Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) policy, whose aim is to invest in and make a social difference in communities from which the Commission draws its staff and/or athletes and/or operates the Commission did embark on CSI projects; selected on the basis of relevance, impact and sustainability.

Strategy and Performance

The 2nd Phase of the Commission's long term strategy; Vision 2028 came to an end in December 2020 and by the end of the financial year, plans were afoot to conduct a performance review as well as develop the 3rd phase of the strategy (2021 - 2024).

Compliance and Risk Management

Implementation of the Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) Policy and Compliance Management Framework were done in earnest, with a view to embed a culture of compliance and risk awareness throughout the Commission and its structures. This was further supported by the Commission's Internal Audit function that provided the necessary assurances Board on the compliance and risk management.

Stakeholder Management

In November 2020, the Commission and the Botswana National Olympic Committee officially entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to collaborate in certain identified areas, with a view to minimize duplications and/or wastages as well as create efficiencies. The Secretariat was tasked with ensuring implementation of the commitments made through the MoU and has been reporting to the Board on a regular basis.

On the other hand, the Stakeholder Compact with the Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sport and Culture Development remained unsigned at the end of March 2021 despite the Commission's attempts to have that come to fruition. Notwithstanding, the Commission continues to maintain cordial relations with the Ministry, which continues to get advice from and funds sport through the Commission.

Overall, the Commission continued to ensure that its reporting to and/or engagements with stakeholders were done with utmost candidness and accuracy. The Commission has over the reporting period improved its utilization of the website and social media platforms, through which it disseminated information to stakeholders.

Anti-Money Laundering and Terrorism Financing

With sport having been identified as a vehicle through which money laundering and terrorism financing could be proliferated, the Commission continued to take seriously its role in abetting the same, through education, dissemination of information as well taking other deliberate actions as set out in the Financial Intelligence Act (Amended) of 2018. The actions of the Commission and other oversight bodies were expected to put Botswana in a better stead to be removed from the grey list by the Financial Action Task Force.

Conclusion

During the period under review, the Board remained resolute in ensuring that that highest standards of corporate governance were upheld, through inter alia, consistently ensuring that there is declaration of interest at Board and Board Committee meetings, that internal and external audits are carried out, that independent people served on Board Committees, inter alia.

The 2020/2021 annual report has adopted an integrated approach, with a view to fairly represent the performance of the Commission.

The Board remains committed to supporting good governance as the benefits of ethical leadership and a well-run Commission accrue to the sporting fraternity.

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FOREWORD FROM THE CEO

Dear National Sport Associations Dear Stakeholders

The period April 2020 to March 2021 was no doubt a very unusual one for us in sport. Never before, at least in recent history, have we had a period when we could neither practice nor not enjoy live sport action; even on television!

So bad was the situation that at some point, we in Botswana could not engage in our favourite early morning or late afternoon walks and/or runs on the streets, because those were either disallowed or we just did not trust the streets to be safe enough. Of course it was not only us in sport, for the infamous COVID-19 was wreaking havoc across all industries, across borders and indiscriminately across religions, cultures and other considerations.

While we are not yet out of the woods, we can only be thankful that as the idiomatic expression goes "we have lived to tell the tale". This is not to downplay the great risk that the Covid-19 pandemic still poses to us, but to say from it we have and continue to learn quite a few things; some good and some bad, and have also come to value things we never really paid attention to.

Whereas there were periods during which the suspension of sport was lifted, holistically or partially; depending on the contact level, so bad was the situation that some National Sport Associations (NSAs) would not resume activities even when they were permitted, therefore completing a whole year of no activity; a very unusual occurrence! This was because of the enormity of the resources; financial and otherwise that were required to meet the stringent demand imposed by us at the Commission and/or relevant other national authorities. Those NSAs that had activities were at best operating at a fraction of their usual levels. Sad development indeed but as we would all agree, we needed to save ourselves from danger, lest we all perished.

The regulation laden period was not helped by the fact that COVID-19 had a seriously adverse impact on economies of the world, to the effect that Governments across the world; including that of Botswana had to cut back on expenditure. We saw NSA expenditure being at a record low in recent history, with some NSAs literally not spending anything in that year.

The suspension of sport, junking of activities that in the period were deemed less important and suspension of projects, inter alia, all but pointed to one thing; sport development and its enablers were being dealt a serious blow from which we shall take time to recover. It is on this note Ladies and Gentlemen that even as we start the 2021/2022 period on the back foot, we need to find ways of navigating the environment and setting forth a course to recovery; so that Botswana sport does not regress by many years.

The lessons from 2020/2021 including that coaching can be done remotely, that international competitions and meetings can be held virtually, that staff can be more agile and adaptable than we may ever have imagined them to be, that technology can and should be an ally of sport, that we have the capacity for resilience and that we need to place a premium on health; including mental health are what we would need to build upon to nurture a more resilient, bullish, successful and sustainable Botswana sport environment.

I would like to extend my profound gratitude to my over eighty (80) staff colleagues, in Gaborone and throughout the country, for their resoluteness and dedication which ensured that amidst the challenges, the Commission did not let its guard down and we can look forward to emerging stronger from the pandemic. Our shareholder, the Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sport and Culture Development also need special mention for they stood by us all the way through. We thank our partners at the Botswana National Olympic Committee and our key stakeholder, the National Sport Associations for some of the successes we had in the year, no matter how little, would not have been possible without them.

Going forward, we will be developing resilience and continuity plans to ensure that the Commission is at all material times, able to deliver on its mandate and promise to Botswana; particularly our young people, people with disabilities and indeed reduce inequities. We still desire to position Botswana sport to meaningfully contribute to the GDP, we want more girls and women in sport, we want access to sport and its facilities by people with disability, we desire proper long term athlete pathways that would not only guarantee good levels of retention but also results in the future and we desire a congenial environment for all our coaches, technical officials, administrators and others to thrive.

Departmental Reports

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SPORT DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT REPORT

1. INTRODUCTION

This report is for the two (2) Sport Development Departments at the Commission, namely the Sport Development Department (SDD) Administration and the SDD Technical.

Collectively, the departments are responsible for amongst other things; ensuring structured talent identification and nurturing of athletes; implementing sport development programmes and/ or projects such as Re Ba Bona Ha, Hall of Fame, Zebra Fund, Elite Scholarship Fund, Centres of Sport Excellence and Heroes Mentorship Programme; setting of qualification standards for Botswana teams to international competitions; providing administration support to National Sport Association(s) and special interest groups such as Women and Sport Botswana and the Botswana Sport Volunteer Movement; amongst other and facilitating that they adhere to applicable policies and laws, in addition to generally supporting good governance.

Whereas the departments continued to operate with near full capacity except that there were delays in filling Sport Development Officer positions at Athletics, Boxing, Tennis and Rugby, there was a serious dearth of activity as a result of restrictions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.

A key position that had fallen vacant in the previous reporting period was filled in 2020 through the appointment of Mr. Peaceful Seleka as Sport Development Manager – Technical; providing the well needed leadership and stability to the Department.

The SDD Administration Department suffered a setback when the hitherto Acting Director succumbed to COVID-19 right at the end of the financial year.

In the next sections, brief report is given on each of the departments' key projects/programmes and/or area of operation with respect to the period April 2020 to March 2021.

2. GOVERNANCE

The Secretariat continued to work closely with all NSAs to ensure that they convened general meetings, as directed by their respective constitutions.

Of the forty-two (42) NSAs that were registered with and recognised by the Commission during the year under review, 19 of them or 46.3% held annual general meetings while 19 or 46.3% held ordinary general meetings.

Those that did not hold any general assembly and thus in breach of their statutes were accordingly advised to correct such governance breaches and advised that if the same were to continue, then action may be preferred against them.

12 or 29.2 % of NSAs submitted Annual Returns to the Registrar of Societies in fulfilment of a condition to remain fit and proper.

Only 9 NSAs or 21.9% filed audited financial statements for the year 2020 – 2021, something that is of grave concern to the department as it is tantamount to noncompliance and hence needs to be addressed.

A great improvement was observed with respect to timely payment of annual subscriptions to the Commission; with 32 having paid on time

3. STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

The decline in numbers was due to the effect that COVID-19 restrictions had on the respective NSA's. The limitation of movement and number of people gathered in one place affected the needed activities that ensure that governance is instilled. Post the lockdown and relaxation of restrictions we did see a number of NSA's ensuring that they adhere to the minimum governance standards.

The Departments benefitted from a partnership with the Japanese Government who funded the construction of the Karate Dojo, with the support of MYSC who provided extra funds to complete the DOJO with upgrade including new training area and toilet facilities.

Debswana Diamond Company continued to fund Re Ba Bona Ha programme and for the period under review, the monetary sponsorship was to the value of One (1) million pula.

4. PROJECTS AND PROGRAMMES REPORTS

4.1. RE BA BONA HA (RBBH)

Activity	Update
Karate Training- KASANE	Following a long lay-off from any sport activities, the Botswana Karate Association (BOKA) conducted a Training week for the Kasane center from 17-22 August 2020. Chief Instructor Solly Nageng drilled the athletes and the coaches in preparation for grading that was rescheduled to November 2020.
RUGBY Strength & Conditioning Course	The Botswana Rugby Union (BRU) organised a Level 1 Strength & Conditioning (S&C) course in Selebi-Phikwe on 24th October 2020. The course was attended by 9 coaches (7 males, 2 female) and 6 of them were accredited.
Coaches CPR Training	CPR knowledge was identified as an essential component that all coaches at development level must possess. In view of this, Secretariat organised A Basic Level 1 (CPR) Course for all RBBH coaches. The course facilitated by Rescue One Botswana was conducted in three (3) venues and a total 65 coaches attended and were certified. Attendance was as below. • 7/Nov/2020 - F/Town: 20 participants • 13-14/Nov/2020 - Maun: 35 participants • 21/Nov/2020 - Gaborone: 10 participants The three (3) areas were chosen to minimize travelling of coaches in accordance with COVID-19 travel regulations between zones.
Tennis Junior Open Championship	The RBBH Junior Open tournament was played in Serowe, hosted by the Serowe RBBH Tennis Centre from 27-29 November 2020. Ninety- five (95) children competed in the tournament that had different age categories from Under-10 to under-17. It was played at the Serowe College of Education and the National Health Institute Tennis Courts.
Kasane Training week & Grading	BOKA conducted training and grading of athletes at the Kasane RBBH Centre at Plateau Hall on 5th December 2020. Following a week of preparations, a total 31 athletes were graded on the day and 28 of them passed the grading (11 girls, 17 boys).
Cricket Mass Participation Festival	The Botswana Cricket Association (BCA) organised the festival at the Obed Itani Stadium in Francistown on the 11th of December 2020. Fifty (50) young cricketers from Francistown schools attended the half a day event where they learned skills and played modified cricket matches.

Programme Highlights

- · Secretariat purchased cloth masks, hand sanitizers and thermometers for all centers to enable them to resume activities and compliant with COVID-19 regulations.
- · A Basic CPR course was organized for all RBBH coaches around the country resulting in 65 of them being certified.
- · Equipment worth P100, 000 was purchased and distributed to RBBH Boxing centers in Lobatse,

Molepolole and Gantsi.

 \cdot As at the end of the reporting period, a consultant was doing a study on the impact of the programme.

Challenges

- · Most activities planned for the year were cancelled owing to the outbreak of COVID-19.
- · Monitoring of centres was difficult due to restricted movements.

4.2. CENTRES OF SPORT EXCELLENCE

This is a programme through which excelling completing students in sports are identified at primary and junior secondary schools are identified and place in junior and senior secondary schools respectively.

For the year under review, only two 2) of initially five (5) and five (5) out of seven (7) schools of excellence resident at Junior Secondary and Senior Secondary schools were fully operational, save to state that they programmes were seriously affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Programme Highlights

· Consultations were at an advanced stage with NSAs to hire full time coaches for all centres at the start of the 2021/2022 financial year.

- · Three (3) Volleyball courts at Mater Spei College CSE were refurbished at a cost of P192, 000.00 and they were handed over in October 2020 by the Minister of Youth Empowerment Sport and Culture Development Mr Tumiso Macdonald Rakgare.
- · Tendering process for construction of two (2) Futsal courts and two (2) Volleyball courts; both with ablutions block at Radisele CJSS CSE was completed.
- · Athletes continued to be assisted with transport and welfare allowances at the centres.

Challenges

- · There was limited activity as school sport was suspended in early 2020 following the outbreak of the coronavirus (COVID-19).
- · Student athletes continued to follow the same syllabus and attend classes as regular students without additional support in recognition of the amount of time they lose due to sport engagements.

4.3. ZEBRA ATHLETE FUND

The Zebra Athlete Fund was established with a view to assist identified athletes with special training programmes to enhance their potential to win medals at major international competitions.

Zebra Fund Highlights 2020

- Twenty-one (21) athletes from nine (9) NSAs were allocated funds in 2020 as per the table below.
- · In November 2020, three beneficiaries from Motorsport were funded to buy motorcycles at a tune of P300, 000.00; something that assisted the athletes to be more competitive as they were previously disadvantaged by their motorcycles breaking down during major competitions in previous years
- · Andile Bekker (Swimming) was placed at the Pretoria High Performance Centre (HPC) for a period 4 weeks in November 2020 and this helped him prepare for upcoming major competitions that included the CANA Zone IV Championships as well as try out at University/College Swimming teams in 2021 when he applies for tertiary education.
- · Training and competition equipment was purchased for Denzel Seetso (Tennis), who was also assisted through the fund with rehabilitation following a major injury setback the previous year.
- · Matlhogonolo Botlhole (Cycling), was also able to purchase a brand new bicycle to the tune of P60 000, 00 through the fund, which will enhance his competitiveness for upcoming major competitions.

Challenges

· Athletes were unable to follow their planned preparation and competition programmes due to challenges brought about by COVID-19.

4.4. FLITE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The fund provides opportunities to athletes who excel in both sport and academics to be placed at institutions of higher learning that facilitate excellence in both sport and academics.

During the year under review, Shameelah Mosweu (Cricket) completed her studies in Sports Studies at Solent University in Southampton, England and returned home.

Elite Scholarship Highlights 2020

- · Twelve (12) athletes from eight (8) NSAs were awarded scholarship in 2020. (See Table 2 below).
- · Amongst these, was the 2019 Junior Sportswoman and Junior Sportsman of the Year Besa Masaite (Chess) and James Freeman (Swimming).

- · A lunch engagement with past and current Elite Scholars and the Sport Development Committee (SDC) was organised in November 2020.
- · Monitoring of Elite athletes based outside the country continued to be done through contact with the respective Embassies and
- · The fund is currently undergoing a review and a draft of the MoU has already been shared by MYSC..

Challenges

- · Some of the athletes were delayed in travelling to their study destinations owing to travel restrictions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- · Those already on scholarships did not have a lot of action; again due to COVID-19.

4.5. SPORT DEVELOPMENT FUND (SDF)

The Sport Development Fund (SDF) was established to increase access and create opportunities for participation in sports through the provision of coaching, equipment and facilities, especially for grassroots and youth sports, girls and women sports and marginalised communities in remote areas.

- In September 2020, the Botswana Table Tennis Association (BTTA) donated some equipment and trained eight (8) coaches in Remote Area Communities (RAC) communities in the Gantsi District under SDF.
- · Sport for All activities were organised in Maun and Serowe in November and December respectively while those that planned for Lobatse and Francistown in February and March 2021 were cancelled owing to the suspension of sport activities.
- Plans to donate sport equipment for the RAC schools in the North West and in Kgalagadi were also cancelled due to unavailability of funds.

4.6. BOTSWANA SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Hall Of Fame Highlights 2020

The Botswana Sport Hall of Fame programme was established to honour and celebrate outstanding Batswana athletes, coaches, and officials for their performance, Leadership and Contribution in the name of Botswana Sport. In addition it also serves to preserve and maintain the rich history and culture associated with Botswana Sport.

- The newly revamped Hall of Fame is located at the National Stadium VIP Area and induction of the Class of 2020 was done at the National Stadium on October 22, 2020 with the following being inducted Mr Kitso Kemoeng, Mr Phineas Maweni, Mr Gaelebalwe Kgosiemang and Ms Eva Kerileng Mwila.
- · That number took to twenty eight (28) the total number of inductees since the programme started in 2014.

WASBO MENTORSHIP FOR EXCELLENCE & SPECIAL OLYMPICS PARTNERSHIP

In August 2020, Mentorship for Excellence International (ME-I), Women and Sports Botswana (WASBO), in conjunction with Special Olympics under Botswana National Sport Commission, partnered to pilot and develop a capacity building training program for special Olympians.

The objective of group mentorship/counselling was to equip and empower the members with skills and competencies, including character building, attaining positive attitudes, and resilience –while adopting a comprehensive approach for personal development and career growth.

The goal was to empower the group members to realize new and undeveloped personal resources and innate abilities. The group goals included developing skills for intentional living, managing relationships, and envisioning and developing a growth mindset.



GAMES DEPARTMENT

INTRODUCTION

The Games Department has the responsibility of providing guidance to and supporting National Sport Associations (NSAs) and other structures with respect to bidding for and hosting of regional, continental and international sport competitions; guided by the hosting policy. The Department is further responsible for hosting the Botswana Games and facilitating the country's participation in international multi-sport competitions; precisely the African Games and African Union Sports Council (AUSC) Region 5 Youth Games.

During the year under review, there was very limited activity in Botswana and no international competitions facilitated by the Commission; all owing to the restrictions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.

BOTSWANA GAMES

The national multi-sport Games that were inaugurated in 2007 and held every two years were scheduled to have been celebrated in December 2021; to, in part, serve their purpose of assisting the Commission to identify and nurture talent for the next edition of the AUSC Region 5 Games, which are celebrated on alternate years to the Botswana Games, as well as prepare athletes for other international competitions.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 induced restrictions during 2020 and 2021, and the enormous financial and logistical burden that would have ensued in case the Commission were to press ahead with hosting the Games, the Board took the difficult decision of cancelling the 7th edition of the Botswana Games.

To partly make up for what would otherwise be a lost opportunity to athletes, a conscious decision was taken to increase funding to NSAs towards the selection and preparation for the AUSC Region 5 as well as to take a larger Team than Botswana would traditionally send to AUSC Region 5 hosted outside of Botswana.

HOSTING BY NATIONAL SPORT ASSOCIATIONS (NSAS)

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, of all the international competitions that NSAs had planned, only the Botswana Football Association (BFA) and the Botswana Tennis Association (BFA) managed to host.

The BFA particularly hosted encounters between their various national teams as well as those of Jwaneng Galaxy Football Club and Orapa United Football against their international opponents.

The BTA on the other hand hosted Hirikgong Junior Cup, Botswana Open, and Parent Education Workshop.

All the competitions during this period were held without spectators due to the Government imposed ban at the time and were held under very strict COVID-19 protocols to the extent that there were no major issues reported post the competitions.

AUSC REGION 5 YOUTH GAMES

The 9th edition of the AUSC Region 5 Games that were planned for December 2020 in Maseru, Lesotho had to be postponed by a whole year due to the COVID-19 pandemic; a development that would mean there would likely be two games in two subsequent years as the 10th edition is planned for Malawi in 2022.

LANDS & FACILITIES DEPARTMENT

STADIA

The Lands & Facilities Department manages sports facilities around the country namely Obed Itani Chilume Stadium, National Stadium, Lobatse Sports Complex, Maun Sports Complex, Molepolole Sports Complex, Serowe Sports Complex and Masunga Sports Complex. The department is tasked with the management and maintenance of the Athletes Village, Gym as well as all land and landed property owned by BNSC.

The Stadia are in fair state of maintenance with the exception of the Serowe and Masunga Sports Complex. Most facilities provide secure parking, conference facilities, kiosks and office space. They mainly host soccer games, entertainment events and others to mention a few. Of the eight (8) facilities, three (3); National Stadium, Obed Itani Chilume and Lobatse Sports Complex, have natural turf and are irrigated using borehole water and the other five (5) have artificial turf.

ATHLETES VILLAGE

The facility was officially opened in December 2020 after it underwent refurbishment to improve its aesthetic appeal and make it user friendly for athletes.

GYM FACILITIES

The department also ensures the Botswana National Sport Commission Gym is in a good state of repair for use by athletes and private customers.

STATE OF THE BNSC FACILITIES

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, there had to be reprioritization by government and its Parastatals which led to funds being significantly reduced. This has had a negative impact on maintenance of facilities (planned/unplanned) resulting in backlog of maintenance of the BNSC facilities.

HUMAN RESOURCES AND ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT

INTRODUCTION

The Human Resources and Administration Department (HRD) has the responsibility of assisting the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) to achieve its strategic mission through proper recruitment, retention and training of human capital as well as ensuring acceptable Labour practices, performance management and adherence to policies, inter alia.

This success of the Department is measured by the ability to align and integrate processes with the BNSC strategic plan and the quality of the output of the human capital.


Owing to both the COVID-19 pandemic as well as the hitherto preparatory work on restructuring, there was minimal staff movements within the Secretariat of the Commission.

STAFF COMPLEMENT


As at the end of March 2021, the Commission had a total staff complement of sixty-two (62) against a structural provision of 87.

STAFF MOVEMENTS

- · Amongst others, the following were the main changes at the Commission: a. The contract of the then Chief Executive Officer concluded in September 2020 and for the remainder of the reporting year, he was replaced by Mr. Tuelo D. Serufho as caretaker CEO.
- · The hitherto Executive Assistant resigned from the employ of the Commission in March 2020 and was replaced on an acting capacity by Research Monitoring and Evaluation Manager
- Ms Elsie Magadi Kenosi (Sport Development Manager Administration) sadly succumbed to COVID-19 end of March 2021 the very last day of the financial year (MHSRIP)
- At the end of the financial year, the Commission had placed two of its employees on indefinite suspension as they were suspected to have committed fraud.

Overall, the attrition rate at the Commission stood at 1.86 % a number that is less when compared to the target of 5% of retention as per the 2017-2020 Strategic Plan.

Training And Development

The budget for the training and development was initially budgeted at amount of P364, 000.00 which was budgeted to be allocated to all departments as per their training needs submitted. Referring to the above budget, in March 2020 There was no training conducted due to COVID-19 but only payments of membership fees; Finance (ACCA) P1,596.37, Audit (IA)P1000, Finance(BICA)P5,362.50, HR & Admin(IHRM)P750.00, Business Development(PRISA) P3,715.11and Procurement (CILTUK) P2,547.23 and HR & Admin (IPM) P1,456.69 which costed total amount of P18,677.90 for March 2020.

In March 2020 an amount of P3377.00 was paid being payment for tuition fee for one employee in the Executive department studying Bcom (Human Resources & Industrial Relations) at Botswana Open University.

Human Resources And Administration Department continued

In the year under review, the Commission from 27^{th} – 31^{st} July there was a five (5) day File & Mail tracking system course which is an intermediate Microsoft Access conducted at CIGNEX Investment training center for two (2) employees in HR& Admin which costed an amount of **P13440.00.**

This was conducted with the aim of equipping trainees with knowledge on how to do electronic records management or database systems and also teach them how to capture data electronically specifically file and mail in records management.

On 29th of October 2020 there was a tuition fee amounting of **P6770.00** paid for CIA part 1 course for the Audit department at BAC. This was paid based on developing the Internal Audit department with their job related knowledge, skills and experts that will contribute to their work units and support to the organizational goals in terms of Audit.

1st to 2nd of December 2020 a Basic Fire Awareness training was offered for ten (10) employees from various departments which costed an amount of **P15**, **000.05**. A Basic First Aid Course was also offered from 3rd to 4th and 8th to 9th December for sixteen (16) employees from various departments and costed an amount of **P24,000.08**. These two courses were not scheduled in the training budget but a recommended by the SHE Officer that BNSC should have employees who have trained in Health & Safety precautions; knowing how to conduct safety during workplace accidents. An amount of **P8,344.00** was used during these two courses which was for subsistence allowances + Meals for four (4) sport development officers working in stadia outside Gaborone who attended these courses.

This Training and Development Evaluation shows that training and development for the year 2020 presented delays due to COVID-19. It also showed ineffectiveness because there were some clashes on dates for training and development with BNSC calendar of events.

Labour Relations

The Commission generally upheld the highest levels of labour practices, to the extent that there were no matters referred to the labour departments or mediated through lawyers.

The Secretariat also continued to keep cordial relations with the National Amalgamated Local Central Government and Parastatal Workers Union (NALCGPWU) and worked with them on numerous projects throughout the year, which were around the restructuring process, separation packages and Apex Body Consultations.

Policies

The following HR policies were reviewed in the year to ensure they remained relevant to contemporary staff issues as well as protect the interest of the organisation:

- a. Since there was a State of Emergency (SOE), Labour had advised that planning activities could be carried out in the meantime before the actual separation with the concerned staff members. Restructuring to take place after State of Emergency. It was imperative that BNSC re-do final notifications to Stakeholders. These were done before end of July 2021.
 - i) Department of Labour notified and have acknowledged receipt
 - ii) Management and Staff notified by individual letters
 - iii) Union Notified and have acknowledged receipt
 - iv) Ministry of Youth Empowerment Sport and Culture (MYSC) were notified.

b. Counselling

i. As the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) is in the process of restructuring, it was only necessary for staff to be offered some Counselling. It was therefore agreed that Human Resources (HR), should engage a professional counsellor to provide counselling services to staff.

ii. The Counselling Sessions commenced and group Counselling undertaken. Individual counselling sessions have also been carried out by the Consultants meeting with individuals at their convenient time and venue. A report has been shared with HR

- iii. Communication has been carried out through emails and other communication platforms. Staff, Branch Union Committee and JNC meetings were carried out and a decision has been reached to have Staff Meetings scheduled monthly. iv. Job Evaluation and Grading
- Skills compatible to the Job Descriptions- pre-preparing activities that can be done, to include Job Evaluation and Grading has been completed and BNSC has received the report from the Consultants.
- 2. The meeting agreed that an opportunity will be presented to the HRC to engage on the Evaluation and Grading after the Subject experts input. A presentation has been made to the HRC, then directed to the Board.

Apex Sport Body - Update

There have been ongoing engagements by MYSC, BNSC and BNOC with a view to streamline roles and responsibilities. There has been a task team by the National Sport Associations (NSAs), which engaged with the NSAs and have presented to the Joint Boards of BNSC and BNOC on their observations and proposals of the models.

1.1. Key Milestone of the Project

- 1.1.1. BNSC is at an advanced stage of further engaging NSAs and numerous stakeholders with the latest being the presentations received from PASSOBO, Special Olympics, WASBO and Traditional Games Confederation.
- 1.1.2. Before end of October, BNSC and BNOC will go back to MYSC as Botswana Sport, having proposals that may have come out inaccurate between BNSC and BNOC plus NSAs.
- 1.1.3. With continuation of the restructuring exercise it may short or mid-term affect the Secretariat as there is a need to be aligned to the Mandate.
- 1.1.4. There is hope that by end of November 2022. International Stakeholders will be engaged, such The Commonwealth Federations, International Olympics Committee, International Sport Federations etc.
- 1.1.5. It is anticipated that before end of Year (2021) to have the draft of the Bill for the review of the BNSC Act and starting the engagements.

- 1.1.6. The Bill will be gazetted to the Ministries and Government Parastatals who shall contribute. While being gazetted, the Members of the Public and other Stakeholders shall be encouraged to contribute to it.
- 1.1.7. Around July next year (2022) the Bill shall be presented before the Parliament for consideration and if approved, then the BNSC Act will be retracted and a new one come into effect August 2022.

COVID-19 and Work Arrangements

With a view to protect its most precious resource; staff, at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, arrangements were made for all employees that could work remotely to do so, with tools such as data bundles and/or laptops provided. For those that could not work from home, a shift system was activated, with the offices regularly fumigated and other protection measures put in place.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the period April 2020 to March 2021 was characterised by COVID-19 cases but Protocols have been observed and adhered to.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

INTRODUCTION

The Business Development Department's function is to initiate, coordinate and facilitate marketing and communications activities of the Commission. The Department is further tasked with enhancing the corporate image and branding of the Commission, pursuing strategic opportunities for the Commission and National Sport Associations (NSAs), in addition to managing bookings of the Commission's facilities and overseeing the general information systems.

For the period April 2020 to March 2021, the Commission was headed by Mr. Modiri Ontitile in the Capacity of Acting Business Development Director with the support of two (2) (officers) and two (2) interns and/or temporary staff.

As would be common cause, the ability of the Department to drive its mandate, especially with respect to resource mobilisation was heavily impeded by the COVID-19 pandemic, to the extent that the Commission registered its lowest income from facilities in a very long time.

Stadia Bookings

There were few activities in the period April 2020 to March 2021 due to the suspension of sport, recreational and entertainment activities, amongst others. Only national team activities were allowed and as would be common cause, such do not generate any income for the Commission; more so given that they were held without spectators.

As a result, the Department could not raise funds through leasing of the stadia around Botswana and advertising. The only money that the Commission realized from the stadia was for the rentals levied to companies that have communication masts at select facilities and that totaled **P 94 963.** The total income from facilities represented a decline of 95 % when compared to the 2019/2020 period.

Realising that NSAs and/or their clubs' income generation ability was adversely affected by COVID-19 to the extent that they would struggle to pay the rental costs for use of the Commission's facilities, a decision was taken that NSAs and/or clubs would only be charged for cleaning and utilities; at cost until such a time that spectators would be allowed.

BNSC Gym

During the period under review, the Gym was operational for a total of eight (8) out the twelve (12) months. For some of the period, it was operational, the gym was only accessible to members of National Teams owing to restrictions imposed on other members of the populace not in national Teams.

Just like the stadia, the gym recorded its lowest performance in a long time, only generating P 322 766 when compared to the prior period.

Significant costs were incurred in the gym when compared to other years as it constantly had to be upgraded to meet COVID-19 protocols; with a view to guarantee the safety of patron.

Athletes Village

For the period April to December 2020, the Athletes Village was not available to the Department an income generation asset as it was undergoing renovations. This, coupled with significantly reduced activity on account of COVID-19 resulted in the Athletes Village only earning **P140 000**.

However, with the improvements made, the year was concluded with great optimism that once restrictions are lifted, the facility will record the highest revenue generation in its history, something that would bode well for the Department in its quest to raise funds for the Commission.

Business Plan

A twelve (12) year business plan was finalised and approved by the Board in July 2019.' The business plan is aimed at positioning the Commission to be more self-sustaining and reduce its dependency on government funding, and was to be rolled out in earnest during the 2021/2022 financial year when resources would be availed to support implementation of that.

It is envisaged that through the business plan, the Commission would increase its revenue by up to 10% per annum, and such should go a long way in assisting the Commission to reduce its dependency on Government funding.

Botswana Sports Hall of Fame

The Business Department in collaboration with the Sport Development hosted the 7th installment of the Botswana Sports Hall of Fame on the 22^{nd} October 2020 at the National Stadium.

At the event that was graced by some senior diplomats, business and civic leaders and officiated by Minister of Youth Empowerment, Sport and Culture Development, Hon Tumiso Rakgare a total of four (4) sport icons were inducted, namely Kagiso Kitso Kemoeng, Eva Kerileng Mwila, Phineas Maweni and Gaelebale Joseph Kgosiemang

Sponsors Day

For the first time in a long time, the Commission did not host a

Sponsors' Day; an event meant to allow the Commission to interact with their current and prospective sponsors in a relaxed setting and further allow for the recognition of existing sponsors.

The key activity of the Sponsors' Day is usually a social golf competition, culminating in an awards and dinner night. Due to the suspension of sport for most of the reporting period, this exercise was not possible and it is the intention of the Department to organisse one as soon as conditions permit.

Botswana Sport Awards

The 40th Botswana Sport Awards were held at the Botswana Television auditorium on 21st November 2020; delivered through a partnership of the Commission, Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC) and the Department of Broadcasting Services.

Whereas the awards had all the traditional categories as they were recognizing performance for the period January to December 2019, attendance, the ambience, look and feel were greatly affected by the COVID-19 restrictions.

Due to restrictions with respect to gatherings, only 50 people were allowed at the venue while traditionally the awards have an attendance rate of approximately 1000 patrons. As tickets could not be sold due to restrictions, the Commission lost approximately P700 000.00 in ticket sales but that should not discount the important fact that athletes and members of their entourages were recognised during a period of great difficulty.

CONCLUSION

The period April 2020 to March 2021 was a particularly difficult one for the Business Development Department, which is generally activity driven. The impact was felt not only by the Department, but also NSAs as not only did they lose their income generation ability, but they could neither secure sponsors nor deliver sponsors activities.

It is hoped that through delivering the business plan, the Commission would not only increase its financial endowment, but most significantly, it would become more resilient during challenging times such as those occasioned by the Covid-19 pandemic.

ADMINISTRATION

The current Botswana Athletics Association (BAA) Executive Committee was elected into the office in June 2019 to serve on a four (4) year term. The Executive Committee acts as stewards of the Association. Governance is their sole responsibility hence there is a secretariat responsible for management and day to day running of the athletics office under their supervision. The Committee's and Secretariat's mandate is to develop and implement competitive structures and programmes that will support and promote excellence in athletics performance and management. Furthermore, the secretariat works closely with the Committee and clubs to ensure that Committee meetings, Annual General Meetings and Special General Meetings are held accordingly as stipulated in the constitution.

2020/2021 BAA ACTIVITIES

The BAA continues to facilitate their activities and programmes on behalf of their affiliated clubs regardless of the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to COVID-19, the major games and championships in which the BAA was to send athletes who had duly qualified for the games were postponed. These are games such as the Africa Cross Country Championships, Africa Senior Championships, Tokyo Olympic Games as well as the World Junior Championships.

Locally, all sporting activities were put to a halt from March 2020 until October 2020. Upon resumption, though under very severe COVID-19 regulations, the Association began with some of its

MEETINGS

The BAA did not manage to honour all its meetings due to the COVID-19 restrictions and financial constraints.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The BAA held four (4) board meetings of which two (2) were physical and the other two (2) were virtual. However, the National Executive Committee had to convene on several occasions whenever there was a need

ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

An Ordinary General Meeting convened in terms of the BAA constitution was held on the 07th November 2020 at Oasis Motel, Tlokweng. The meeting was sanctioned with observing the COVID-19 guidelines, those in the Greater Gaborone region attended physically whilst those outside the Greater Gaborone Region attended virtually.

COMPETITIONS

The Association sanctioned though under strict COVID-19 regulations host track and field events. The competitions alternated between Gaborone (for athletes in the Greater Gaborone Region) and Francistown (for athletes based in the Greater Francistown Region). This went on until the last track and field hosted on the 20th February 2021.

Sport View Runners Club in conjunction with the BAA hosted the 20th February 2021 event, where we saw impressive performances by two (2) of our sprinters. A junior athlete Letsile Tebogo of Lefika Athletics Club went on to break a 10.20 record previously held by Isaac Makwala in 100m to set a new National Record of 10.14. Loungo Matlhaku went on to erase Lydia Jele's 100m record of 11.39 to set a new national record of 11.24 in the women's 100m.

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

The Botswana Athletics Association in its attempt to attract and train skilled personnel, has through the World Athletics and Confederation of African Athletics, been able to develop technical officials, coaches, administrators and those in leadership positions through educational programmes at a national level.

The educational programmes that took place between 01st April and 31st March 2021 are as follows;

Competition Management Seminar 7th July 2020

Nine (9) participants from Botswana Athletics took part in the seminar facilitated by the World Athletics & Confederation of African Athletics (WA/CAA) through the African Athletics Development Centre

Virtual Sport Administration Course for Athletes 20th - 26th July

Athletes were submitted by Botswana Athletics affiliates to take part in the course conducted by Botswana National Olympic Committee.

WA/CAA Women in Leadership Virtual Refresher Seminar 1st -2nd September 2020

16 women from Botswana Athletics affiliates attended the empowerment seminar conducted by World Athletics through the Africa Athletics Development Centre.

Virtual Sport Administration Course for Administrators 16th -22nd September 2020

The BAA secretariat enrolled and successfully completed the course facilitated by the Botswana National Olympic Committee.

Prevention of the Manipulations of Competitions 7th - 8th October 2020

The President of the Association and the General Manager participated in the Webinar facilitated by the International Olympic Committee, in conjunction with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime.

Board and Secretariat Retreat

A working retreat organised for the BAA Board and secretariat took place at The Big Valley Game Lodge in Lobatse, from the 30th of October to the 01st of November 2020. Discussions were held regarding the BAA Constitution and possible ways to align it to the BNSC constitution, the development of governing policies, strategy review and other statutes. Facilitators during the discussions were Mrs. Tapiwa Masunga of TMM Sport Solutions and Mr. Kealeboga Keitseng, BNSC Research, Monitoring and Evaluation Manager.

Coaches Education Certification Systems (CECS) Level 2 Sport & Hurdles Course 14th - 17th December 2020

World Athletics through the Athletics Development Centre held a coaches course of which five (5) in our level II coaches participated.

Technical Officiating Education Course (TOECS) Level I

The Technical Officials Education Course (TOECS) was held from the 14th - 18th December 2020. Through sanctioning by the World Athletics, Botswana Athletics Association was able to conduct a level 1 Technical Officials Education and Certificate Systems Course (TOECS). Mr. Thomas Ndadzilla (Botswana) facilitated the course and Enias Nhoro (Zimbabwe), who are World Athletics accredited course facilitators. The objective of the Level I Course is to provide participants with the theoretical and practical training required to

make them capable of officiating at national level competitions and at international competitions held within the country. 24 technical officials attended the course.

DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRAMMES

Debswana Re Ba Bona Ha (RBBH)

The Debswana Re Ba Bona Ha programme kicked started well in the year 2020 in all the centres of Maun, Gumare and Shakawe. However, the progress was short-lived by the national lockdown and later by the suspension of school sport as well as sport in general, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Although there were no student activities for RBBH, the BNSC continued with their financial support to the centre coordinators and coaches.

Centre Of Sport Excellence

The BAA has two (2) CSE centres, being Mogoditshane Senior School (Filed events) and Goodhope Senior (Track events). However, Mogoditshane Senior School Centre has not been active for some time. The Goodhope Senior School had 13 athletes; (4 Female athletes and 9 Male athletes). The students under the programme were assisted with their allowances for toiletries and transport. The athletes did not have an opportunity to compete at school level as the school sport was halted by the outbreak of COVID-19.

SPONSORSHIPS

BNSC Athletes Zebra Funding

The Botswana Athletics Association made a recommendation of five (5) athletes to be considered for Zebra Funding. The athletes who were approved by BNSC included Ditiro Nzamani; Leungo Scotch; Tshepiso Masalela; Oratile Nowe and Thomphang Basele. Each Athlete was allocated P100 000.00 for the financial year of 2020/2021, but the athletes could not utilize the funds due to financial constraints posed by the COVID-19.

Olympic Solidarity/Continental Scholarships

The Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC) enrolled 12 athletes for both the International Olympic Scholarship and Continental. The program was established to assist athletes to prepare and qualify for the upcoming Olympic Games. For the International Olympic Scholarship athletes are, Isaac Makwala; Karabo Sibanda; Baboloki Thebe; Onkabetse Nkobolo; Nijel Amos; Christine Botlogetswe & Galefele Moroko. The Continental program covered Leaname Maotoanong; Boitumelo Masilo; Ditiro Nzamani; Leungo Scotch & Zibane Ngozi.

ACHIEVEMENTS

40Th Botswana National Sport Awards (21st November 2020)

As it has always been the norm, out of the six (6) nominations for the 40th Sport Awards, athletics took home four (4) awards. The Association won:

- · Sport Man of The Year (Leungo Scotch)
- Sport Woman of the Year (Galefele Moroko)

- Team of the Year (Men's 4*400m Relay)
- · Coach of The year (Kebonyemodisa Dose Mosimanyane)
- · Sport Person of the Year (Leungo Scotch)

Missing out the Junior Male and Junior Female categories were Bernard Olesitse and Boitshepiso Kelapile respectively nominated.

Olympic Preliminary Team Camp

With the postponement of the 2020 Tokyo Olympics Games, the qualification window was extended to 29th June 2021.

A preliminary team training camp that had initially begun in January 2020 and disbursed due to the COVID-19 outbreak and resumed on the 15th of January 2021. A composition of 18 athletes, a manager and a coach.

By end of March 2021, only four (4) athletes had qualified for the Tokyo Olympic Games. The athletes are Nijel Amos (800m), Galefele Moroko (400m W), Christine Botlogetswe (400m W), and Amantle Montsho (400m W).

The BAA in conjunction with the BNOC is working tirelessly to facilitate the qualification of other athletes and the relay teams. Currently, the men's 4*400m relay team is in good standing, ranked 11th whereas the ladies relay is ranked out of the Top 16 in the world. The athletes have already taken part in different BAA 2021 events. They have all shown an improvement on times in their different disciplines. Athletes registering the season's best performances with every competition, including a few personal best performances, and national records, prove this.

OVERVIEW

The 2020/2021 Botswana Amateur Fencing Society (BAFS) sporting activities were seriously affected by the constraints of the COVID-19 virus which continued to challenge the development efforts from the previous year. The key highlight was the graduation of a new batch of Fencing Masters from training in Johannesburg, South Africa in November 2020.

The dedication to achieving gender equity in Botswana Fencing continued with sustained efforts to develop high-level women athletes with the support of the International Fencing Federation (FIE).

On an international level, the FIE continued its support for Botswana Fencing through the Facilitation of virtual training courses as well as the sustained annual donation of training equipment.

Fencing's return to the Olympic arena ended up being postponed to 2021 as the International Olympic Committee resolved to monitor the developing COVID-19 situation while keeping athletes safe. International competitions were initially postponed then suspended and eventually cancelled by the FIE from March 2020.

MASTERS TRAINING PROGRAMME

The beginning of the year 2020, saw the BAFS send Laone Lesajane, Thabile Pilane and Camille Gombalume to be enrolled into the FIE Masters Training programme hosted in Johannesburg, South Africa. They returned at the end of the year (2020) to increase our Masters complement to eight (8).

The BAFS is proud to have enrolled another Fencer Kate Lebolie into the FIE Masters Training programme 2021 to maintain the momentum already achieved. In our continuing drive for gender equity in the sport, the BAFS is proud to note that they are headed for a positive development where Botswana will have four (4) female Masters as a part of their code at the end of 2021.

A BRIEF OUTLINE OF COMPETITIONS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The 2020/2021 season was disrupted internationally and nationally as the COVID-19 pandemic led to the FIE suspending all international Fencing competitions. The news was received with extreme disappointment as advanced preparations for the Junior World Championships in Salt Lake City, United States of America were cancelled. The Tournament was to have been held from the 3rd to the 11th April 2020, and a promising young athlete Alakanani Warona was denied an opportunity to demonstrate his prowess by the pandemic.

Locally, when the COVID-19 restrictions were relaxed for a time, the BAFS managed to stage the Gaborone Open at Baisago Campus on the 10th October 2020 and the National Championships at Baobab School on 1st November. Both tournaments were held while observing the strictest safety protocols. The initiatives were welcome as athletes had not had an opportunity to gauge their individual progress over an extended time. The rest of the calendar was suspended indefinitely as it was decided that competitions could no longer be carried out for safety reasons. The suspension of tournaments turned out to be a setback for the BAFS as the Gaborone Open was observed by a potential sponsor with an interest in supporting cash prizes for athletes winning Gold, Silver and Bronze medals.

With regards to development, the sport managed to send out Masters to Jwaneng and to Francistown as part of our outreach initiatives to support clubs across the country. The fencing masterclasses are an effort to support coaches and athletes in their development. It is also an opportunity for Masters to report back with regards development of the sport across Botswana.

There was a highlight during the year under review where Thobega Fencing Academy initiated wheelchair fencing. The drive was in part to change the perception of the sport making Fencing more inclusive. This was also the first step of a long-term vision to one day field an athlete at the Paralympic games. This development is a welcome since there had been an encouragement to develop the sport at the Commonwealth Fencing Federation (CFF) AGM held on the side lines of the 2019 Senior World Championships in Hungary. With this start for wheelchair fencing, the BAFS will be empowered to seek further support for the sport in general and wheelchair-bound athletes in particular.

WORLD FENCING DAY 2020

On the 12th September, 2020 the BAFS managed to host a muted World Fencing Day in Modipane as part of keeping up the morale of the athletes in a challenging year. We also took the opportunity to reinforce some COVID-19 education as well as host a brief master class for the small number of athletes who could attend. The Theme for the year was "Fencing, a Passion, a Family" because our sport empowers people across the globe to come together, working in unison to share a common passion for and commitment to fencing, striving to overcome today's challenges and sharing hopes for the future.

Debswana Youth Chess Championships

Debswana Youth Chess Championship is one of the most important youth events in unearthing chess talent in Botswana, with an age range of five (5) years to 18 years. It is one of our key deliverables in developing chess at the grassroots level. The event is sponsored by Debswana Mining Company under the auspices of Botswana Chess Federation.

After adapting to the new normal, the championship was played both in the North and South regions, at the same time spreading it across, normally it is used as a continental qualification event divided into two stages.

The tournament was a one in all event, with boys playing against girls. To cater for more players, but limited to COVID-19 Health regulations, it was categorized as under 20.

The event was hosted by Our Lady Primary School in Francistown and the University of Botswana in Gaborone, over three (3) days in December 2020.

A total of 77 players graced the tournament.

Boys - 45

Girls - 32

A total of P40,000.00 caters for the championship with P20,000.00 set aside for the coaching clinic.

Development Centres

The Debswana Diamond Mining Company and the Botswana National Sports Commission (BNSC) has embarked on a nationwide programme to develop various sports disciplines in Botswana. Chess happens to be one of the sports codes in this programme. The first Debswana Re Ba Bona-Ha Chess Centre was launched in Gaborone in 2012. The Gaborone centre now boasts of over 60 children aged between five (5) and 13 years who are assembled during weekdays to train and play chess. The Gaborone centre has 10 satellites attached to it which are in Gaborone and surrounding areas.

The second centre which was officially opened in Francistown at Our Lady of the Dessert Primary School on 2nd August 2014 to cater for the talent in the North also boosts almost the same numbers of the players. The Francistown centre has seven satellites attached to it.

Both the two centres and the satellites have produced some great athletes, thanks to the mentorship of volunteering coaches. The performance of our Junior Chess team has greatly improved due to the strong developmental grassroots plan.

We continue to notice an increase in the number of young athletes taking part in RBBH centre competitions.

WORLD, CONTINENTAL AND REGIONAL REPRESENTATION

All our events were held Online. With Chess at the forefront technology-wise, BCF was able to participate in tournaments organized by World Chess Federation (FIDE) and African Chess Confederation.

2020 World Online Chess Olympiad

This was the biggest ever first online World Chess Olympiad. The tournament was played in a knockout format. A team of twelve (12) players assembled at the National Stadium to play their biggest world online tournament, of which five (5) were players aged below 18 years. With technology in abundance, some of our players played at their residence, South Africa, Maun, Serowe and Jwaneng.

Botswana managed position seven (7) out of 10 countries.

A total of 3000 participants graced this tournament which was held in August 2020.

The BCA had four (4) Full Time Development Coaches who were based in Francistown, Selebi Phikwe, Molepolole and the South-East District. They conducted regular training sessions at the various schools in their respective areas between Monday and Friday. On Saturday mornings pre-selected players were invited to attend specialised coaching sessions at the various "hubs". These sessions were severely impacted by the suspension of all school sports from mid-March 2020 to date due to the COVID pandemic. We were only able to conduct sessions from mid-January to mid-March 2020 and from mid-October to mid-December 2020 for National Team Squad players as per the Government Regulations.

We had set ourselves a target of 22,000 children to be involved in the sport for 2020. We achieved 26.2% of our target within a limited time period of approximately two (2) months of 2020. If not for the pandemic, we were in a good position to meet the target we set for ourselves. The pandemic affected our programme severely.

Training Camps

There were no training camps held during the year although we had planned to have two camps; viz. U19 Boys Camp & a Women's Camp. These were cancelled due to the pandemic.

Tournaments & Tours

The Majority of the local tournaments were cancelled due to the pandemic. We had no plans for any local tours for any of our teams for the period of reporting. We had only managed to conduct a U15 Boys 6-a-side tournament in Selebi-Phikwe in February 2020.

INTRODUCTION

We have seen another year coming to an end and now have to take stock of how the year unfolded and take the lessons learnt and take them to the year we are just about to commence. This has been a very testing year in many ways and arguably the most challenging in Botswana Cycling in recent times. The COVID-19 pandemic turned upside down the cycling agenda and the planned programmes for 2019/2020. This is not to say there was nothing achieved, but we found ourselves lagging behind in most areas. From March 2020 to now (September 2020) cycling was effectively closed, with some coordinated activities starting to take place in June 2020 and the official resumption of BCA season being 1st August 2020.

We were able to achieve something before the COVID-19 pandemic. We were busy preparing a team for the Continental Championships and things looked promising seeing the quality of the team that we had selected. We also saw successful hosting of some races by our affiliates.

The governance requirements, such as having audited financial statements, were still expected to be delivered and accountability cannot be compromised even in a difficult and challenging year. We will therefore report and account to our affiliates and to our principals (BNSC, BNOC, CAC & UCI) as and when required.

ACTIVITIES & ACHIEVEMENTS

World Cycling Centre Training Camp (Two Camps Organized by UCI)

September - November

Nine (9) athletes were sent for training in Paarl, South Africa. This was in preparation for the Africa Games as well as the Africa Cup event which was cancelled.

January - March

Two (2) athletes were also sent for training in preparation for Africa Road Race Continental Championships destined for Mauritius. The two (2) athletes are:

Tefo Kaludi Botrail Cycling Club

Africa MTB Continental Championships destined for Namibia

Cycling has been earmarked for competing at Tokyo 2020 Olympic through Matshidiso Ebudilwe. Botswana National Olympic Committee is yet to confirm her participation as they have applied for the wild card from Olympic Solidarity. She is currently training locally.

The Programme is also supported by UCI as it has since donated ten (10) entry-level mountain bikes. Both the bicycles and the monetary pledge are yet to arrive. The delay has been caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

COURSES AND TRAINING

The BCA attended Organization Course in December 2019. It is through the same course that the BCA managed to assist with the above-mentioned support. A proposal was sent to UCI and it was approved.

Fund Applications

Cycling submitted the applications for two (2) athletes and they were not considered. These were:

Elite Scholarship

BCA has submitted an application for Matshediso Ebudilwe which was considered. She is enrolled with one of the local institutions

Equipment

We have since accumulated some equipment from the BNSC. This was through the Africa Games and also through the funds that were budgeted for the Continental Championships. The Treasurer will expand further on the BCA Equipment Inventory.

National Championships

All the national championships were held as planned on different dates

This first year of our 3-year term has had a lot of challenges. The two (2) issues that brought about the biggest challenges were the COVID-19 and the unity or effectiveness of the Executive Committee.

The Committee that was elected at the AGM last year has not been able to effectively work together to deliver the mandate of BCA. On 7th August 2020, Four members of the EXCO wrote to the President raising a number of issues of concern. It was not the first time the concerns raised in the letter were brought up. While the concerns have not yet been addressed, it will be important for the differences to be addressed to enable the committee members to discharge their responsibilities effectively for the benefit of the BCA affiliates and cycling in Botswana.

COVID-19 brought about unforeseen challenges that could not have been predicted. It has had a devastating impact on our year and disrupted our racing schedule. Nationals Championships were not held. We are confident that the cycling community and BCA affiliates have the resolve to fight and see cycling back to winning ways.

We have failed to have a Management meeting as planned due to unforeseen circumstances and a situation worsened by the COVID-19 pandemic. However, going forward, we will have to explore other ways of holding our meetings.

There are other pending activities and processes that we need to initiate, implement and complete. These include but are not limited to the development of the new BCA Strategic Plan, Transfer Guidelines, Race Regulations and so forth.

It is worth noting that the committee is in full complement as outlined by the association constitution. Despite most members of the committee being in the North of Botswana, the committee works so hard to have meetings that are aimed at improving the status of the association. It is also on a sad reality that the association's bank account with Stanbic Bank was frozen due to not having any activity for more than three (3) months. The reason for none-transaction was brought by concentrating much on complying with the requirements of the Botswana National Sports Commission and the Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sports and Culture where associations were required to submit some documents. The exercise took long for the association as some documents could not be easily accessed after the office that was housed at the BONA Courts was closed resulting in files being misplaced.

As indicated in the last financial year's report the association was expecting to have completed the alignment of the strategic plan to that of the BNSC but due to unforeseen circumstances it has not yet materialised. We are still hopeful that the exercise will be carried out soon.

In February 2020 the executive committee met in Gaborone to evaluate and amend the plan of activities. The meeting was very successful as the amended plan was shared with the BNSC and the membership the week following the weekend of the meeting. As per the resolution taken at the meeting the plan was immediately rolled out although COVID-19 took over making it so difficult to completed what was intended.

LEADERSHIP FORUM

For the first time since the 2018 elective AGM the association held the leadership forum at the Second City of Botswana Francistown. The forum was well attended with over 30 participants from 16 affiliate members. The forum was aimed at discussing several

policies and documents with the membership and to prepare for the Extra-Ordinary General Meeting (EOGM). Each office had the opportunity to present about roles and mandate of their offices in a view to get members appreciate the work done by different office bearers and for them to suggest ways of bring out the best out of each office. Some of the documents discussed include the constitution, Strategic Plan, Development Plan and the Elections Guidelines.

As indicated above, one of the aims for the forum was to prepare for the EOGM. Through discussions and resolutions taken the forum concluded that it was ready for the EOGM as these resolutions could only be authenticated by the General Assembly.

At the end of the forum the Executive Committee, through various portfolios, gave members an assignment to make sure that they align their constitution and other policies to that of the association and by extension to that of the BNSC. It is very imperative to indicate that for the first time in this financial year the association saw a growth of membership especially community clubs and Dance Studios

TRAINER OF TRAINERS WORKSHOP

The main objective of the workshop was to equip trainers with the necessary skills and information that they were to teach beginners once the development plan rolls out. About 22 trainers attended the workshop.

Taking advantage of the workshop, a coaching clinic was conducted for clubs in and around Francistown with a view of assessing the trainers. The activity went on well and it was evident that another workshop was needed to sharpen the trainers' skills and knowledge of dancesport.

BRANDING

In 2018 the AGM approved the new BODANSA Logo which then prompted the executive committee to resolve in rebranding the association. It was for this reason that the association managed to purchase a few branding materials. Since some activities had been put on halt by the Corona Virus Disease pandemic a date for the rebranding launch will be decided once everything normalises.

CHALLENGES

Like it is indicated at the beginning of this report the association experienced some challenges due to several reasons.

BNSC Compliance

The firs challenge the association experienced was that of delaying to start the 2019/20 activities. It is worth noting that the Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sports and Culture, through the BNSC, had requested for some documents from all the NSAs. Since the association had to relocated from the office by BONA courts it took some time for the association to fully comply with the requirements hence the delay in rolling out the 2019/20 program.

Bank Account

As the association was still battling with compliance the bank account with Stanbic Bank was also frozen for non-activity for a period of more than three (3) months. The freezing/closing of the account took us strides back as we had to start the exhausting process of opening the account with another bank. It was only in January 2020 that the association managed to complete the process.

The above mentioned meant the association could only start full operation in January 2020.

Annual Plan

This is the fundamental aspect of any organisation as none can

function without a plan of activities lest it fails in its mandate. The plan that was espoused at the beginning of the financial year 2019/20 never materialised until January 2020. This compelled the leadership to come up with a new plan that could try address all the challenges faced in 2019. This was also shared with the BNSC and the Bodansa general membership for appreciation.

COVID-19 Pandemic

As already known the pandemic came at a time when a lot of activities had been planned for all over the world. Botswana was no exception as we were greatly affected. For dancesport all the activities stopped, and it was our hope that things would get back to normal for the association to continue where we had stopped. With several activities that were planned for, the association believed it would have done a lot to recruit more members and get the sport growing. Some of the activities affected included the following

- i. Extra-Ordinary General Meeting
- ii. Adjudicators Training
- iii. Meepong Championship
- iv. Annual General Meeting
- v. Re-branding Launch vi. Meetings with potential Sponsors
- vii. Media Tour
- viii. Development Plan implementation

The above are just a few from several activities that were affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

CONCLUSION

It is our humble belief that most of the challenges are and were an eye opener to the executive committee, most importantly the COVID-19. These challenges have compelled the committee to try and come up with better ways of achieving the association goals despite the challenges. It is our hope that the association will have a better plan of having our athletes as they are our major clientele, without them the sport would be dead.

Three (3) Committee members could not complete their turner of office due to deferent reasons as shown below;

- Mr. Moses Galeboe resigned and Mr. Pelotlhomogi Malefho was appointed as the Acting President
- Mr. Ben Tshaba Moilwe was deployed in Ethiopia on official assignment and was replaced by Mr. Victor Wolfenden as the Tournament Director (TD)
- The late Mr. Neo Badubi was replaced by Mr. Thato Maphorisa as Public Relations Officer (PRO)

The Botswana Darts Association (BODA) is a National Association responsible for darts activities by affiliated bodies. The BODA currently consists of two affiliated bodies in the country being, the Northern and Southern Region, with a total of 21 clubs. The BODA is also an affiliate of African Union Sports Council (AUSC) Region V Darts Confederation.

The sport of Darts is currently not an Olympic sport and this means the BODA has very few international competitions that lead to only one (1) international competition in a year within the Region V countries.

Nonetheless, the Association has been reliably informed by the AUSC Region V Darts Confederation that processes are underway for the game of Darts to be exhibited at the Olympic competitions.

BUDGET ALLOCATION

The Botswana Darts Association was allocated funds amounting to P250 000.00 for the 2020/2021 financial year.

An amount of One Hundred & Four Thousand Seven Hundred

and Fifty Pula was used to settle the outstanding Appearance and Performance Fees for the 2014 National Team for which the late Badisa Mpejane was omitted from the list.

An affiliation fee of \$2000 USD was also requested for payment to AUSC Region V Confederation, while Ten Thousand & Twenty Pula was paid to the Auditors.

ACTIVITIES

The BODA could not engage in any darting activity due to the eruption of the corona pandemic that affected the whole universe. Even though darting game is not a contact sport, Botswana Darts Association could not manage to commence their activities due to a number of factors not limited to the following;

- · Adherence to COVID-19 protocols
- · Insufficient funds to acquire COVID-19 equipment
- Controlled and restricted Zonal movements and rapid lockdowns.

The following Annual Activities were suspended;

- Regional Leagues
- · Local Tournaments
- Regional Club Events
- A.U.S.C Region V Darts Confederation also suspended the Region V Darts Championship which was scheduled for Eswatini in response to COVID-19 protocols and our National Team activities were affected in that regard.

Only the Northern Region (NRDL) managed to run one successful trial tournament during the month of December which was attended by 45 contestants.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Botswana Darts Association and both regions successfully managed to hold their Annual Conventions.

the BODA AGM that was postponed from the 13th February 2021 was due to insufficiency of funds was later held virtually on the 6th March 2021 where a new National Executive Committee was elected.

Botswana Integrated Sports Association (BISA) is a Secondary school based sport management body affiliated to Botswana National Sport Commission, Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC), Confederation of School Sport Associations of Southern Africa (COSSASA) and International School Sport Federation (ISF).

The Association is run by an Executive Committee of eight (8) people, six (6) elected members and two(2) ex-officios.

KEY ACTIVITIES

COMPETITIONS

The main sporting activities usually include the BOFINET league, Local tournaments and International championships.

BOFINET 2019/2021

Following consultation with clubs, the BOFINET 2019/2020 league was cancelled because of the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent country-wide lockdowns and halting of sporting activities. BoFiNet has also decided that in addition, the total balance of BWP 659,502.74 will be divided and awarded to all the thirty-eight (38) clubs as a blanket grant towards the transportation costs they incurred during the 2019/20 BoFiNet Softball League. The funds that will be awarded as a blanket grant will be taken from the money that was accrued to pay for the 2019/20 BoFiNet Softball League prize winners. The total sum of BWP 192 860.00 will be used in preparation by clubs and the Botswana Softball Association, in general, to prepare for COVID-19 compliance for the upcoming 2020/21 BoFiNet Softball League. BOFINET committed to reimbursing summary costs that clubs had incurred to play the unfinished league. This was done in January 2021 and an amount of P16, 487. 56 was paid to each team through their club accounts.

Local competitions

The annual Selibe-Phikwe Extravaganza tournament was held over

the President's holidays, and the Jwaneng Easter Tournament did not take place because of the COVID-19 pandemic and suspension of sporting activities.

There were no international competitions due to the pandemic.

APPOINTMENT ON NEW OFFICE BEARERS

The Association had vacancies from the resigned PRO and Treasurer positions which were dully filled after nominations from Clubs on 25th June 2020. This was in line with Article 12.3 (a) (iii) of the Constitution which allows adoption of the officer in the last quarter. The officers are Thato Matenge appointed as Public Relations Officer and Puso Kgosietsile as Treasurer. Their term in office had been aligned to the term of the then NEC members which came to an end in April 2021.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The BSA annual general meeting which was to be held in April 2020 could not occur because of the country-wide lockdowns imposed because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. Another AGM was organized in November 2020 but was had to be adjourned because of poor internet connection. It was both physical and live-streamed. The 2020 AGM was subsequently combined with the 2021 elective AGM which was held on 24th April 2021.

INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

Fencina

The Botswana Softball Association entered into an agreement with Manase Construction (Pty) Ltd for the Design, supply, and installation of a perimeter fences around the Botswana Softball National Diamond in Gaborone on 28.10.2020 at a cost of P409,487.18. The project was to be done in one month from November to December 2020, however, a few additional works were requested which extended the date of completion. The additional works included refurbishment of the tuckshop, isolation room and dugouts. The project was well executed and was handed over on 13th May 2021. The project was supervised by the facilities Committee which the handed over to the National Executive Committee.

Ablutions

In 2019 BOFINET had agreed to sponsor BSA with the erection of the Ablution and Change Room Facility to the tune of P210, 000.00. The construction of the facility has since been deferred due to financial constraints faced by the sponsor.

SUB-COMMITTEES

Due to increasing responsibilities, National Executive Committee established sub-committees to assist in carrying out tasks in specific areas. These committees were included under the portfolios of individual National Executive Committee members. The members of these committees were experts in their field and therefore played an important role as "think tanks" and advisors for National Executive Committee. The committees were as follows:

Facilities Committee

The members were as follows: Gloria Gaosikelwe (Project Manager), Pako Maforaga, Romeo Tshelametse, Naletsana Ditsele, Monkgogi Thakgathi, Same Molete, Keneilwe Moeng and Gontlafetse Batsetswe. The committee oversaw the maintenance of the National Diamond and the Manase project which was handed over to the BSA in May 2021.

OVERVIEW

The Season was devastated by COVID-19 lockdowns and restrictions, with training impossible and the very future of the sport and the livelihood of coaches threatened. All events were cancelled both locally and internationally. For the first time since our inception, we were unable to hold Botswana Nationals. Africa Seniors was cancelled, and the Olympic Games were postponed.

Once sport began to reorganise itself to the 'new normal' swimming was quick to respond and both safe training and successful galas were arranged with the clubs playing vital roles in giving momentum to swimming. It is a testament to the good adherence by clubs and the natural safety of the sport of swimming in terms of COVID-19, that no cases of infection have been recorded either from training or from the competition.

Even with this good record swimming has once again come to a stop as Botswana struggles with new surges of COVID. As the BSSA we both appeal to clubs to always adhere to restrictions that our superiors impose for our safety, as well as appealing to our superiors to consult with us as a responsible sport, before imposing any restrictions.

The BSSA would like to congratulate their clubs for their resilience and positive spirit in these trying times. We remain confident that this is an inherently safe sport, and that we attract the type of athletes, coaches and administrators that rise to any challenge. Swimming after all is, first and foremost, a life skill without which many people have perished.

BSSA SWIMMING GALAS

The BSSA managed to arrange five (5) galas during the first quarter of 2021. Two (2) in Francistown with many thanks to Stingrays for organizing and hosting, and three (3) in Gaborone with many thanks to Propellers, G.A.C. and DMSS for organizing and hosting. We were then unfortunately forced to stop the remaining planned galas as COVID-19 restrictions were tightened.

With restrictions on travel and a limit of 50 people to an event or gathering the BSSA was forced to cancel Botswana Nationals.

With world events pushing ahead the BSSA has unsuccessfully appealed to mother bodies to assist us with appealing to the government for training to continue. Only National teams are allowed to train and the BSSA is now under pressure to select teams early so that training can continue.

OTHER SWIMMING COMPETITIONS

With travel and COVID-19 restrictions, most regional and international competitions during this period were either cancelled or postponed. Some of our elite swimmers swimming outside Botswana have managed to compete at competitions for their clubs and schools.



FINANCE AND SPONSORSHIP

Swimming was not able to take advantage of the good relationships we had built with our main sponsors during the previous year. Stanbic, Wimpy and Cresta deserve to be mentioned anyway and we are sure once the sport is able to resume, they will be with us.

Our running expenses have been slashed due to COVID-19, but we were able to draw from our B.N.S.C. grant for our expenses.

The BSSA received a development grant from Fédération Internationale De Natation (FINA) which we did not fully utilise because of COVID-19.

Full details of the finances are available in our audited financial statements

SCHOLARSHIPS

During the period under review, we received three (3) scholarships for swimmers, being FINA, Elite and Zebra.

During the period under review, we also had three (3) swimmers receive funding toward the 2020 Olympics.

We also have three (3) swimmers who previously received Elite Scholarships and are still on them.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVIEW

A constitutional review was initiated by BNSC and is at an advanced stage, with clubs having given submissions and the BSSA having engaged the pro bono services of a lawyer, Mr. Virgil Vergeer, to assist with developing swimming flavoured Constitution within the framework given by BNSC. COVID-19 has also impacted this process with face to face meetings not being possible, but we believe we will end up with a better constitution. We thank Clubs that made submissions for doing so and Mr. Vergeer for his time and guidance.

STRATEGY REVIEW

The BSSA Strategy review has unfortunately been postponed due to not being able to hold face to face meetings because of COVID-19.

RECORDS

The keeping of proper swimming records has long been a point raised, and we have undertaken to complete this work by the start of the new season in September.

SUMMARY

Technology has allowed the BSSA to function and regular online meetings have assisted greatly in keeping things running. But training and competition, the actual business we are here for, is suffering. We will continue to call for the resumption of swimming lessons, training and competition, as soon as possible.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The constitutional amendment was conducted and given the green light by the register of societies on the 28th October 2020. The key issues are the office tenure changed from two (2) years to four (4) years. Secretary-General changed to Vice President Administration, Treasurer changed to Vice President Finance and Competitions secretary changed to Vice President Technical. The quorum for constitutional amendment changed from 51 per cent to 75 per cent of the members attending the meeting.

FINANCE

The introduction of bank transactions for tournaments registrations and payments of prize monies proved to be available tool which made us viable in the fight against COVID-19 and also becomes a key financial tool of proper recordings of transactions.

TOURNAMENTS

Our tournament calendar for 2020 was that we host tournaments in Francistown, Palapye, Ghanzi, Kanye, Maun as part of our mandate to take table tennis to the people and bring it closer to those who can't afford to travel to Gaborone for tournaments and this was cut short by the national lockdown that happened in April due to the Corona Virus. After lockdown, we continued hosting tournaments even though we resorted to hosting tournaments in Gaborone only due to limited zonal movement.

Congratulations to Tshepiso Rebatenne for being the first player to win the award. The aim of this award is to make a huge impact on Table Tennis players by transforming their sports life to professionalism. Resources permitting it will come bigger and better in 2021.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

The team recently participated in the South Africa (Bloemfontein) regional tournament where three (3) of our athletes lost in the quarter-finals. Promising results indeed but it must be noted that we did not meet our target of being the regional champions though it is clear that the dream is alive we will continue investing in achieving our target.

GRASS-ROOTS

For our Grass-roots program we had already donated tables at Maun before lockdown, so after lockdown we picked up where we left off and managed to donate mini table to preschool in Zowa, Ghanzi, Charleshill, Serowe, Kanye, Moshupa and Palapye just to name a few, the guest is still and the mandate is to donate minitables to at least one preschool in every major town and village. We are also grateful to coaches that help us in grassroots development for example Mr. OG Lebele of Khakhea development centre how has committed to training kids from as far as primary school.

REMOTE AREAS INTRODUCTION OF TABLE TENNIS

BTTA introduced Table Tennis at Xhanagas primary school in Ghanzi and Maposa Primary school in Nata through donation for Table Tennis Table, rackets, balls, Netts and availability of coaches for proper technical introduction.

INTERNATIONAL OLYMPIC COMMITTEE SCHOLARSHIP

Mr. Rorisang Raesima was given the International Olympic (IOC) coaching scholarship which he will conduct through the United States of America University and thanks to the Botswana National Olympic Committee for leading from the front.

Phoenix Assurance Group Botswana signed an agreement with the BTTA to sponsor every tournament in the 2020 calendar year with P96 000.00, the Association then decided that all the money will be used on price money so that more as much as we want to table tennis to grow the players to must benefit financially from the sport and be able to cover certain expenses that come with being a player e.g. buying equipment (Racket), even during and after the lockdown Phoenix never turned off the deal but instead they invested P50000. 00 for our independence Grand finale of which it was split to 25000. 00 for both men and women as a life-changing award.

Tshepiso Rebatenne was the first beneficiary of the Phoenix Assurance Group life-changing Award through winning P31 000 during the independence day. P25 000 of Phoenix Assurance Group Life-Changing Award and P6000 of mandatory prize money for being the champion of the tournament.

INSURANCE FOR TABLE TENNIS PLAYERS

Recently Phoenix Assurance Group Botswana CEO Mr. Chiswo announce that they will provide players with insurance of up to P50 000.00 in case they get injured while take part in any table tennis activity and need serious help.

MEDIA

We also got a very warm reception from the Media, having a table tennis feature every week, either in newspapers, journals, television, radio, social media etc. The exposure really helped the association in terms of growth and reaching out to the people. We will always be thankful for the work that was put in by media houses

BABONENG TELEVISION PRODUCTION COMPANY PARTNERSHIP

The 3-year partnership enabled BTTA tournaments to be broadcast live on Botswana Television, the process which is increasing our publicity and recognition with TV rights income generation for the association expected to yield more funds for BTTA in the year 2021.

2021 THE YEAR OF INCLUSIVENESS CHANGES IN BOTSWANA TABLE TENNIS

The school of Table Tennis which attract kids from the earlier stage will be fully functional and will spread to the other zones as well, so far it is based in Kanye and Gaborone (BNYC).

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

To close the gap in terms of performance between the ladies and also to increase the level of competition in the ladies category weekend training for ladies only was introduced and it was conducted by Mr. Joseph Kgatlampane and Mr. Kealeboga. This training involved physical training, skill training and coaching.

COMPETITIONS ELABORATED

Botswana Table Tennis Association tournaments were held from January to December 2020 in Gaborone, also the South African Table Tennis Board held a tournament in December themed "SA return to table tennis" which was held in Bloemfontein which we sent a team to take part.

COMPOSITION

Tournaments


BTTA managed to stage only few tournaments due to COVID-19 and lockdowns, only 12 tournaments were held in Gaborone and one (1) international tournament in South Africa. Due to COVID-19, most tournaments were postponed and cancelled.

BNYC management provided us with two classrooms for our tournaments which has optimal conditions (lighting, cleanliness, and play area) despite meeting all standards the playing Area cannot accommodate more tables but rather accommodated only two (2) tables per room, which did not sit well with our schedule. BTTA managed to secure a deal with Baboneng television to broadcast live with Botswana Television

Our tournaments had to hire COVID Marshalls and a SHE officer in the venue for COVID-19 protocols (sanitizing, registration, temperature check of people entering the area), SHE was engaged for necessary medical needs also.

The Botswana Tennis Association (BTA) is an affiliate and subscriber to both National, Continental and International sport governing bodies. At National level, Botswana Tennis is an affiliate of the Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) as well as the Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC). At continental level, the Association is affiliated to the Confederations of African Tennis (CAT) and the world tennis governing body; International Tennis Federation (ITF) at world level.

In fostering the benefits of its affiliation, the Botswana Tennis Association sends representatives to the Annual General Meetings (AGM's) held by these governing bodies. The association as the only tennis regulating body in the country works closely with schools sporting associations and affiliated tennis clubs.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS BY BNSC AND BNOC

President Thipe attended the Botswana National Olympic Committee (BNOC) annual general meeting in November 2020 and 2021.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS BY CAT & ITF

The president attended the virtual ITF/CAT general meeting on the 20^{th} to the 21^{st} of November 2020, and also attended the CAT AGM on the 12^{th} of November 2020.

BTA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Due to the COVID-19 and lack of funding the proposed annual general meeting for the association could not take place.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF PAST ACTIVITIES

Botswana Tennis as the governing body endeavours to ensure that players reach their optimal levels of performance to be able to compete globally and therefore rendering them to various levels of competitions from local, continental to international. The association has in the past year organized tournaments and sent players to compete across the globe. Below are the competitions organized locally, continentally and internationally that the players have competed under.

HOSTING OF TOURNAMENTS

Competition plays a huge role in ensuring sports growth and the association has not taken setbacks despite limited funding and the COVID-19 pandemic. The association has managed to host the following tournaments and COVID-9 protocols were also observed.

Local Tournaments

As one of the initiatives by Debswana and Botswana National Sport Commission to develop tennis at grassroots, the Association through the Re Ba Bona Ha Coordinator managed to organize a tournament in Serowe village. Serowe College of Education and Serowe Institute of Health Sciences (IHS) courts were the hosts. The Tournament attracted huge participants and most categories were well represented. The Tournament was held from the 26th to the 29th of November 2020.

CAT/ITF Tournaments

Botswana International Junior Tournament & Euphemia Tlhapane tournament: Due to the high rising of the pandemic Botswana Tennis Association postponed the Grade 5 ITF/CAT that was supposed to be held in April 2020, and Grade 4 ITF/CAT Tournaments which were supposed to be held in April and November 2020.



PARTICIPATION IN CONTINENTAL & INTERNATIONAL TOURNAMENTS

In complying with tennis developments most of the ITF/CAT Tournaments were postponed due to the rising numbers of the pandemic but before that Botswana Tennis Association managed to send a team to attend few Tournaments.

ITF/CAT Under 14 Junior Circuit in Madagascar

The Association sent four (4) players that is 3 girls, 1 boy and a coach to partake in the event in February 2020.

ITF/CAT 18 & under African Junior Circuit in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe

The association sent five (5) athletes and one coach to take part at the event that ran from the 5th to the 12th of June 2021.

Circuit Absolute Federation Catalonia in Barcelona

Ekua Youri played this event on the 31st of August to the 5th of September 2020 in Barcelona and lost at the Finals.

IT/CAT Under 12 Junior tournament in Mozambique

The tournament was supposed to be held first week of January, the association was to send 8 players but because of the pandemic, tennis Namibia cancelled the event.

Under 14 African Junior Circuit in Madagascar

On the first leg Mark Nawa finished 5^{th} on his singles matches and lost his doubles in the 2^{nd} round. On the second leg he lost his singles at the quarter finals and got position 6 and scooped position one for his doubles. This results made Mark to reach a milestone to be ranked 9th in Africa by the Confederation of African Tennis (CAT) in 14 & under category.

COACHING ACTIVITIES HELD

Officiating Camp

The workshop was held from 11th to 13th December 2020 by Mr Charles Mosokwane. The purpose of this workshop was to refresh the minds of our match officials on rules and procedures of tennis given that there were no activities during the year. We did not have satisfactory or expected numbers of participants. We had expected to have at least twenty participants but only ten were able to attend. Nonetheless we had to continue with the course. Despite the low turnout of the participants the course was a success because the participants did indicate the value it added to their knowledge of officiating and they requested the same course be held at least twice a year.

3 Play and Stay coaches' courses

In a bid to spread tennis to all corners of the country, the BTA saw it fit to host play and stay courses which essentially covers the basic fundamentals of tennis coaching.

ITF PARTICIPATION CAMPS

Gaborone

There was a training camp held in Gaborone from 11th - 18th December 2020. The camp was attended by around 16 participants, with about 11 Boys and 5 Girls. The vast majority of kids who attended were above the age of 15 and at a more advanced level thus suitable for Under18 tournaments. However, we did have about four (4) girls who were at an intermediary level. Overall the camp went along smoothly other than disturbances from the weather.

Molepolole

Another training camp was held in Molepolole from 14th – 18th December, 2021. During this period all the kids were beginners but they were determined to learn and they gave all their best to make sure that they learn from this program.

Some of the issues encountered were as follows;

- · No resources and accessible facilities
- · Lack of financials for coach's upgrade
- · Lack of equipment
- Limited courts
- · Coaches need to be educated more
- Organization of tournaments
- The kids walk a long distance from their houses hence why they don't really get players.

Masunga

The camp had 12 participants, among the 12 we had five (5) Girls and seven (7) Boys with age range between 8 years to 14 years. Most of the players were beginners with hunger for the sport, disciplined, motivated and they had almost all the attributes of a tennis player. This made our sessions easy and interesting and the kids grasped a lot form the camp, fun and easy were our top priority and we achieved them without any struggle.

Maun

The camp ran from the 15th to the 19th of December 2020. Though on some days we were affected by rains. We managed to have a good insight on the situation there and the locals were happy and impressed.

We were also given an Award at CAT AGM for best Development programs in 2020.

BOTESSA currently has employed two (2) officers namely; the Administration Officer and the Assistant Administration Officer who are responsible for the day to day running activities of the association.

INTRODUCTION

Botswana Tertiary Student Sports Association (BOTESSA) is a registered association with Botswana Registrar of Societies and is a member affiliate of Botswana National Sport Commission (BNSC) and an associate member of Botswana National Olympics Committee (BNOC). It is also an affiliate member of Confederations of Universities and Colleges Sports Associations (CUCSA), Federation of Africa University Sports (FASU) and International University Sports Federation (FISU).

PAST ACTIVITIES

BOTESSA Ordinary General Meeting (OGM)

BOTESSA did not have the OGM in June 2020 as per the constitution due to Covid-19 protocols and restrictions. The Ministry of Youth Empowerment Sports and Culture (MYSC) through the Botswana National Sports Commission (BNSC) put everything to a halt. All was not lost since the association had the Extra Ordinary General Meeting (EOG) that was held on the 13th March 2020 at the Institute of Health Sciences (IHS), Gaborone. Mr. Kgari was endorsed at the EOG meeting as the Vice President Technical.

BOTESSA Annual General Meeting

The BOTESA Annual General Meeting was held on the 23rd January 2021 on both physical and online platforms at Travel Lodge in Gaborone. The meeting considered the President State of the association, the Executive Report, and Financial Report. The meeting was supposed to be held on the 10th of December 2020 in Francistown as per the constitution but the meeting could not take place due to covid-19 restrictions. The meeting was postponed to the 23rd January 2021 in order to guard against these issues as stipulated by BNSC Management. The general membership

endorsed Mr. Emmanuel Seiphetho as the Communications and Marketing Officer for BOTESSA.

Technical Committee Online Meeting

The BOTESSA Executive Committee held an online meeting with the Technical Committee on the 27th October 2020. The purpose of the meeting was to craft the strategies on how best the athletes can be engaged during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

Initially BOTESSA's Annual General Meeting was scheduled to take place in Francistown and the Association had plans with Nyangagwe Hospital to donate sanitizers to the hospital. The re-scheduling of the meeting to Gaborone tempered with the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) activity that BOTESSA had planned to do and could not do it in Gaborone either.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK BOTSWANA (FNBB) BOTESSA BOTSWANA TENNIS ASSOCIATION (BTA) PLAY AND STAY TRAINING

The Association managed to train a number of BOTESSA member affiliates on BTA Play and Stay at Notwane Tennis Club from the 6th to the 9th of November 2020. The training was facilitated by Botswana Tennis Association in conjunction with BOTESSA.

FNBBBOTESSA and Botswana Football Association (BFA)

The BOTESSA also managed to conduct training for its member affiliates from the 14th to the 18th of December at BUAN and FCTVE. The BOTESSA Football Coaching Course that was facilitated by BFA took place both in Gaborone and Francistown concurrently. The two trainings went well without any challenges.

FNBB BOTESSA Student Representatives Council (SRC) Virtual Meeting

The Student Representatives Council (SRC) virtual meeting was held on the 4th of February 2021 by BOTESSA Executive. The committee discussed issues of importance e.g. executive report and the financial updates so that sports ministers were kept abreast of what the association is going through. They also deliberated on the issues affecting the association during this covid-19 pandemic and to map the way forward on how e-sports can be incorporated in the association. They also came up with solutions on how best the association can close the communication gap that was existing between the two.

CUCSA General Assembly

The CUCSA General Assembly was held online on the 10th April 2021. The Treasurer Mr Nyati, CUCSA Executive member, The President Mr Setlhare and the Secretary General attended the meeting online. The meeting considered the use of sub-committees in the CUCSA structures and the following six candidates were nominated to sit on different sub-committees from BOTESSA thus; Mr. Nyati Finance Sub Committee Chairperson, Mr. Patrick Moesi the The CUCSA Technical Committee Sub-committee, Ms Botho Thobega the Control Sub-committee, Inspector Metshameko Disciplinary Sub-committee, Mr. Nelson Bodilenyane Transformational and Mr. Emmauel Seiphetho Media and Communiations.

FASU General Assembly & FISU-CUSF Strategic Dialogue

The FASU General Assembly was held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia on the 26-27 March 2021. BOTESSA was represented by the Secretary General Mr. Moreetsi Kediseng and Mr Emmanuel Seiphetho the Communications & Marketing Officer. The Secretary General also made a presentation at the assembly.

FISU-FASU-NUSF Seminars

BOTESSA managed to send two delegates to Uganda on the 11-12 December 2020 to attend the FISU-FASU-NUSF Seminar. The seminar was attended by Ms Botho Thobega, the BOTESSA vice Secretary General, Mr. Bonang Gasebonwe, the BOTESSA Assistant Admin Officer. The seminar was held under the theme 'crafting the strategy in sports in the face of uncertainty', and the BOTESSA Vice Secretary General made a presentation on the University Sports Movement.

FNBBBOTESSA Digital Plan during Lockdowns

COVID-19 forced the BOTESSA to close the office and the whole nation was on lockdown. The Executive Committee came up with numerous initiatives to keep the spirit of sports going for its athletes. BOTESSA came up with a digital plan with a number of challenges and rolled it out to its member affiliates and the sponsor. These

This tournament was the first of its kind to be hosted successfully by BOTESSSA and the winner from both the individual categories walked away with P750, 2nd Prize was P650 and P450 for third prize. The tournament was well organized by Mr Vincent Masole from the Chess Federation.

FNBB BOTESSA Webinar

The BOTESSA also managed to host the FNBB BOTESSA Webinar on the 16th July 2020 immediately in the midst of the lockdowns due to COVID-19. The webinar discussion was held under the topic 'Experiences, thoughts and Uncertainties on Tertiary Sports, Physical Activity and Wellbeing of Athletes within the context of Covid-19'. The presenters were Ms Nomsa Mahlangu, the FASU President from South Africa, Mr. Ross Tebele Special Needs, Mr. Justice Dipeba National Athletics Coach, Ms. T. Magang Women Football and finally Dr. Tshephang Tshube from the University of Botswana the Sports Exercise Psychology. The webinar was successful because it was attended by people from different countries in Africa and the world at large.

FNBB BOTESSA Online Media Training

The BOTESSA held the workshop for both the Executive Committee and the Technical Committee on the 05th September 2020. The purpose of the workshop was to train the participants on how to handle issues of media and it was a success. The workshop was facilitated by Mr Fox Phatsimo from Ya Rona FM

BOTESSA Executive Committee Retreat

The BOTESSA Executive Committee had a retreat on the 06th to the 9th November 2020 at Manong Lodge near Lobatse with their Patron Kgosikgolo ya Batlokwa Kgosi Puso Gaborone who is also the Chairperson of Ntlo ya Dikgosi. The retreat was successful because the purpose was to re-look, re-think based on the current structures and see whether there is progress and most importantly to introspect.

Empowering Women in Sports

The BOTESSA Women in Sports Commission (WISC) Interim committee had a Mentoring workshop at Manong Lodge near Lobatse whereby they managed to cascade their strategy from BOTESSA strategy. They also developed the terms of reference for the commission which was approved by the BOTESSA Executive Committee at its meeting held on the 27th to the 29th December 2021. They had invited Ms Retshabile, the PRO of WASBO to assist with the knowhow. The two documents are still awaiting the approval of the general membership. The BOTESSA WISC Interim Committee is chaired by Ms Lebogang Motsumi from Tlokweng College of Education and Ms Botho Thobega is the Vice Chairperson.

FNBB BOTESSA Principal/Directors Meet

The Association managed to engage Principals and Vice Chancellors of different institutions on the 9th of March 2021 on a virtual platform. The purpose of the meeting was to brainstorm on how best the athletes can be assisted during these difficult times especially when it comes to e-sports.

Introduction of New Codes

The BOTESSA and Botswana Karate Association have signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on the 6th April 2021. The BOTESSA President, Mr Keorapetse Setlhare and the President of Karate Association Mr. Tshepo Bathai appended their signatures to the agreement.

On the other hand the association is working tirelessly to sign yet another Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Botswana Boxing Association (BOBA). This will help BOTESSA to positively influence the next generation of young boxers in our universities to participate in the upcoming FISU Boxing tournament and FASU activities that have been postponed to 2022 due to covid-19.

Lichess Online Training for BOTESSA Executive Committee

The Botswana Chess Federation conducted a workshop for the Executive committee for Lichess on the 16th April 2021. The whole purpose of the workshop was to train the committee so that they are at par in terms of understanding of what will be happening during the FNBB BOTESSA Online Chess Tournament. The training was facilitated by Mr Vincent Masole.

INTERNATIONAL GAMES

FISU Games

Due to COVID-19 restrictions the BOTESSA could not partake in any international games. The CUCSA games that were scheduled to take place in Lesotho were postponed to 2022. The FASU games are taking place and the BOTESSA athletes cannot take part due to the fact that sport is at halt in Botswana. The Ministry of Youth Empowerment Sports and Culture took a decision to put any sporting activities to a halt except for national teams. BOTESSA was supposed to take part in the FISU games and they have since been postponed to 2022.

Relationships with the Media

There has been a massive increase in the media coverage of all the BOTESSA league games, tournaments, international events and general meetings. Special thanks to the young and vibrant media sports personnel employed by The Department of Information and Broadcasting through BTV, RB1, RB2 and Daily News, Duma FM, Ya Rona and Gabz FM radio stations, including the local private newspapers. All activities organized by the association at bracket, national and international levels were well covered. The BOTESSA Facebook page is currently very active and the website will be launched very soon.

Relations with Other Stakeholders

The BOTESSA had an on-line meet and greet with the Permanent Secretary (PS) of Ministry of Tertiary Education Research Science and Technology (MOTE). The purpose of the courtesy visit was to make the PS aware that there is an association called the BOTESSA that is entrusted with the running of sports at tertiary level.

The BOTESSA Executive members also paid a courtesy visit to the Permanent Secretary of Ministry of Employment, Labour Productivity and Skills (MELS) in order to strengthen the relationships and the association status with different other stakeholders.

2020 COMPETITIONS

The Botswana Volleyball Federation initially circulated a document with guidelines on return to play post-COVID-19, after the first lockdown in which resumption was to be July 1st, 2020. This was supposed to be followed by further guidance on local competitions, but we held back while monitoring the COVID-19 situation, which was proving to be difficult to control. At the very least, we had intended to return to our self-sponsored tournament with increased playing time and sponsorship. It became clear that the disease's curve was not flattening, and we had to postpone the tournament, hoping it would be possible to hold it either later in the year or early in 2021.

We are currently in touch with several promising potential sponsors and hope for the best. The business had been slowed down as a result of the recent lockdown.

WORKING PARTNERSHIPS

Incepta Communications

It was brought in to assist in searching for sponsorship and brought in such proposals as re-branding. The company helped in increasing our market visibility. Amid the beginning stages of engagement with potential sponsors, the COVID-19 pandemic brought our endeavours to a stop in terms of direct contact and engagement with companies.

Molapo Crossing

The partnership meant to assist in the development of beach volleyball. The company is mandated to seek sponsorship for competitions and national teams. A working document had been launched early in the year with efforts so far being hindered by the pandemic.

Bring It Promotions Support - 2020 And Beyond

The Botswana Volleyball Federation has hosted 2 NCAA female Universities teams from the USA for friendly matches and joint

development training in conjunction with Bring It Promotions LLC - Volleyball Management, a company based in the United States of America between 2018 and 2019. As a part of that collaboration, several projects were lined up for 2020, i.e., hosting three (3) teams in Botswana for the 2020 tour, a technical visit by 10 USA University coaches to work with local coaches and youth teams in April 2020. A training programme in which three (3) female players simultaneously would train for periods of up to one month with a top team in Slovenia and invitation of the Botswana women's team to the Global Challenge Competition in the Czech Republic.

Following the advent of COVID-19, the resultant travel restrictions of all the above plans had to be revised. The Botswana Volleyball Federation has kept constant communication with the Bring It Promotions Management team during the first half of the year. These communications have shown the agreement of a plan to facilitate the implementation of the above developments beginning 2021 onward.

MEDIA ENGAGEMENT TRAINING FOR EXCO. & COMMISSIONS

As part of the re-branding exercise in collaboration with Incepta Communications, the BVF held media engagement training for the BVF Executive and Commissions Chairpersons. The agreement is that this training initiative will roll out to Affiliates representatives.

2020 FIVB DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS PLATFORM

The BVF secured the services of Brazilian Coach Augusto Jose Sabbatini for a period of 3 months (from December 1, 2019 to February 29, 2020) through the support of the Federation of International Volleyball (FIVB) Projects Platform - Coaching Support for Technical & Tactical Development of National Teams.

The 2020 FIVB Development Projects Platform applications opened on the 1st of August and the BVF will once again apply to take advantage of this support. Affiliates are informed of developments in this regard.

DEVELOPMENT

Re Ba Bona Ha Annual Mini Volleyball Festival

Our annual Re Ba Bona Ha mini volleyball festival was not held mainly due to Covid 19 related challenges.

Admissions To Cse Form 1 And Form 4 - 2020

Volleyball athletes enrolled in CSE Junior Secondary Schools (Artesia, Okavango and Radisele) and CSE Senior Secondary Schools (Mater Spei College in Francistown and Lobatse Senior Secondary School). Training, however, has not been conducted regularly due to COVID-19 restrictions.

CSE Equipment Handover

The handover of the refurbished playing courts and equipment took place at the Mater Spei CSE Center.

NATIONAL TEAMS ACTIVITIES & COMPETITIONS

Volleyball Competitions In 2020 Tokyo Olympics Qualifiers - Women

The senior national women's team participated in the Tokyo Olympic qualifiers held 2nd – 10th January in Yaoundé, Cameroon 5th.

Five (5) countries took part in the competition, with our team coming in 5th. The competition victors were Kenya athletes who went on to represent Africa at the Tokyo Olympic Games.

2020 Bvb Competition Bvb Continental Cup - Men & Women

The BVF sent women's and men's teams to the Beach Volleyball Continental Cup zonal stage held in Maputo, Mozambique, from 10th to 15th January 2020. Six (6) countries took part in the competition per gender. Botswana's men placed third (3rd), while the women were ranked 5th.

By placing 3rd, the men's team had qualified for the continental phase of the competition. The competition itself is a qualifier for the Tokyo Olympics. However, the BVF could not send the men's team to the next stage due to a lack of financial resources.

2020 Training Camp Out Of School Training Camp

Following the completion of the continental qualifiers, the Federation

took advantage of the availability of the coach. The FIVB requested the coach organise a training camp for under 20 boys and girls. The training camp took place in Gaborone from February 17th to March 1st, 2020, attracting 33 athletes (22 boys and 11 girls).

CAPACITY BUILDING INITIATIVES

With the support of the CAVB, the BVF has used the period of inactivity to enhance technical officials' development through the attendance of online training sessions (Webinars). BVF officials have so far participated in the following webinars:

- · Volleyball Coaching Interaction one (1) Coach
- Webinar: How to Maximize Your Practice Time one (1) Coach
- Refereeing for Modern Volleyball and New Technology (Volleyball) - four (4) International and two (2) National Referees
- Personalities and behaviour of volleyball referees four (4) international and two (2) national referees
- Competence and Career Prospects for Beach Volleyball Referees
 four (4) International and two (2) National
- New medical assistance Beach Volleyball Referee Regulations: four (4) International & two (2) National Referees

Coaches and referees were officially registered to participate in these webinars, while those who were not registered could follow all of the above live on Facebook

The Federation has also sought assistance from CAVB on development proposals outlined below:

- Online management course Intended for BVF Clubs' Executive Committees, BVF Commissions and the BVF Executive Committee. An online management course that will last three (3) months; participants will need reliable internet access.
- Press development Assistance with broadcasting and marketing capacity will be provided. Opportunity to include the provision of necessary tools and linkages that would expand coverage of BVF events even in the absence of television. This initiative exists to target the Marketing Commission and club pros.
- Coaches' development To help keep local coaches up to date with new trend.
- Data Volley To improve volleyball data systems.

ACTIVITIES

Botswana Wrestling Federation (BWF) hosted several online events this year even though we were challenged by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Free Style Wrestling Match

We managed to organize a Free Style Wrestling Match in Palapye. The event was held successfully and the styles that were done were Free Style and Greco Roman for both male and female wrestlers. That was our last physical event before the COVID-19 challenges. The event was held on the 29th February 2020.

Online Female Wrestling Match

We managed to organize an online Female wrestling match because we were challenged by the lockdown due to COVID-19. This was our first Online event and everything was organized successfully and many wrestlers countrywide were able to take part in this event.

Online Greco Roman Wrestling Match

Online Greco Roman Wrestling Match was our second online wrestling event and was also organized successfully. Our main intention was to keep wrestler's fitness levels at a better level by introducing this online wrestling event and also as a way of exploring other platforms to keep our activities running even under the challenges of the lockdown and COVID-19.

This time around there were no medals for teams and wrestlers since it was an online event. COVID-19 was indeed a challenge to us as a federation during preparations for this event. This is one of the biggest events on our calendar.

Taking Wrestling to the People

During the year 2020, we managed to take wrestling to the people by holding several live interviews on radio and print. The Federation's President Moagi Sharp who is also the official spokesperson of the Federation was interviewed live on Radio Botswana, Duma FM, Gabz FM and Yarona FM. Sunday Standard Newspaper, The Voice Newspaper, The Telegraph Newspaper, The Botswana Guardian Newspaper and The Botswana Gazette Newspapers wrote several articles about our wrestling events. Media continues to be our stakeholder in taking the sport of wrestling to greater heights in terms of growth and we commend them for a job well done.

Way Forward

The Federation is intending to buy wrestling equipment in 2021 because we are still challenged with this issue of lack of proper wrestling equipment like wrestling rings and championship belts. We want it to be known that we want to introduce other styles of wrestling like Entertainment wrestling (the one we usually watch on our Television sets at home)

The annual year was a terrible year for sports, the sporting events were all suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Weightlifting like any other sporting code was focused on the Tokyo 2020 Olympic qualifiers. We struggled to pursue the qualifiers nor train properly because there were lots of lockdowns in most countries including Botswana. Planned events could not be realised due to the closure of many countries due to the pandemic.

Financially we suffered more because our sorting code gets very little funding from the BNSC so we had decided to save our grant for the commonwealth qualifiers for the team with the team local camp inclusive. Unfortunately, we were suddenly called for a meeting to be informed that no sporting activity will be funded as the government has decided not to let anyone leave the country nor participate in any activity outside the country. We, therefore, forfeited our total grant.

Weightlifting Federation of Africa (WFA) donated a set of equipment with few pairs of training shoes for the Federation. This will assist our sport as our equipment and sports attire are very expensive.

Technically, National team training continued locally especially Magdeline Moyengwa who was funded by the BNOC through

Olympic funding. She got into camp locally with other members of the Olympic team. It was not an easy training because there were lockdowns in the country and curfew restrains. We could not go for international training and all other training plans were shelved especially the referees training as it was planned to be conducted within the financial year.

The athletes struggled with gaining strength. Kgotla was also drafted into the local camp through his Zebra fund and unfortunately, the BNSC instructed us to take him out of camp sitting for lack of funds even though we had never used the funds and we were preparing him for a Junior World Championships.

Challenges were many even though we laboured through to make sure we qualify for the Olympics but the senior team was on and off with training due to sport suspensions. We had to ask to train the National Senior team under strenuous situations as we did not have funds at all to support them. Due to these challenges, we have learned to be fully prepared for the dilemmas to come as it seems we are going to take some time to recover. We want to do a lot of online training and online competitions, therefore, we need to secure gadgets to be used like a long lens camera with a tripod stand, a good laptop with a secure network.

ACTIVITIES

Makgadikgadi Epic Skydiving Symposium Event

The Parachute Association of Botswana (PAB) has been for a number of years organizing the Famous Makgadikgadi Epic with the help of Botswana Tourism Organization. The event is held during the July holidays every year. With the event is a must go for local, regional and international skydivers around the world. Due to the Pandemic of COVID-19 which hit our shores in late 2019 the, 2020 event was postponed to 2021, only for the 2021 event to be further postponed to 2022. The vaccine roll-out having commenced internationally, we cautiously expect that the 2022 event will definitely take place.

Public Outreach

The Parachute Association of Botswana had become a staple for events such as the Gaborone International Airshow, the Botswana International Airshow, the Khawa Dune Challenge and Cultural Festival et cetera. We would use such events to promote skydiving and recruit new students by undertaking demonstration skydives. Due to the Pandemic of COVID-19 which hit our shores in late 2019 the, 2020 events were postponed to 2021, only for the 2021 events to be further postponed to 2022. The vaccine roll out having commenced internationally, we cautiously expect that the 2022 events will definitely take place.

Training of Licensed Skydivers One (1)

The Parachute Association of Botswana had planned to hold a local recurrency and progression skydive weekend in December 2020. Due to budgetary and other constraints which arose from the BNSC not being in a position to fund the event, either as initially planned or even after we postponed it to early 2021, that made that reality impossible. We would have imported a suitably qualified instructor from South Africa.

Training of Licensed Skydivers Two (2)

The Parachute Association of Botswana had planned to start training skydivers locally from April 2021. Such training was meant to leverage the previous event that appears in the two initial paragraphs above, with such preceding events, the lack of funds

from the BNSC made that reality impossible. We would have, again, imported a suitably qualified instructor from South Africa.

Botswana National Skydiving Competition

The Parachute Association of Botswana had planned a national competition that was supposed to be held during the weekend of the 27th to the 28th March for a 2-way Formation Skydiving and Accuracy Landing competition. Due to lack of Funds from the BNSC and also the suspension of sports by the Government, the event ended up being cancelled. The competition would have been the first official event to be held in Botswana.

Community outreach

The Parachute Association of Botswana held a community outreach in Francistown at the Old Stadium in October 2019, where licensed skydivers and the public undertook jumps. This event was held, fortunately, just before COVID-19 hit our shores. We planned to make this an annual event, but again, we were then forced to postpone from 2020 to 2021, and then again from 2021 to 2022.

United States Parachute Association (USPA)

The Parachute Association of Botswana is using the forced hiatus from COVID-19 to migrate from the Parachute Association of South Africa Manual of Procedures to the United States of America model. The latter has a wider international acceptance and appeal whilst the former is only practised within our sub-region. Currently, our "C" and "D" license skydivers are working on getting their coach and then instructor ratings under the USPA. This will enable the Parachute Association of Botswana to license skydivers locally without having to import a suitably rated skydiver.

Currency

COVID-19 has made it extremely difficult to maintain the currency requirements of our licensed skydivers. With some pride, however, it must be reported that we managed to conduct recurrency training at Matsieng Aerodrome in February 2021.

External Training

Despite COVID-19 and a lack of the usual funds that we always

relied on from the BNSC, our now current skydivers have started attending currency and progression training externally. This is mostly in South Africa.

SUMMARY REPORT ON ANY SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY INITIATIVES UNDERTAKEN

Sowa Primary School

After the 2019 Makgadikgadi Epic event, we donated school uniforms and other apparel to Sowa Primary School. Our plan is to continue with that initiative once COVID-19 allows us to continue with such an event.

Wellness Day Events

The Wellness Day Event was held on October 2019 at the

Francistown Old Stadium with the Northern Bar, Legal Aid Botswana, Botswana Defence Force and other Stakeholders. The organisers immediately agreed to make it an annual event and to then roll it out to other regions, only for COVID-19 to manifest itself. The 2020 event, for instance, had been agreed for March 2020 but we had to postpone the same.

2020 & 2021 Calendars

The points above noted apply with equal measure to our 2020 and 2021 Calendars. Budgetary constraints and COVID-19 having resulted in us not undertaking our planned events, the initiatives planned have not taken place. We intend to carry on as planned as soon as circumstances permit.

- · Constraints and lack of sponsors, we are also affected by the pandemic (COVID-19) that impacted the planet, suspending all sporting activities until further notice. So very little has been done since last year up to date. Nothing happened due to lockdown. The only available activity is the camp for athletes on trial to qualify for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. The training camp, which began in September 2020, is ongoing until qualified athletes leave to participate in Tokyo 2020. They were 14 athletes on camp, Nine (9) Men and Five (5) Women. Only Two (2) athletes have qualified and will be taking part in the competitions.

CONCLUSION

The pandemic has affected the lives of our athletes, resulting in only Two (2) being available to participate at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. Initially, there were three (3) accepted athletes; (2 Men and 1 Woman) however; and due to injury, one (1) athlete was unfit to complete.

Professional Boxing Association of Botswana (PBAB) is a duly registered organization and is registered with the Registrar of Societies as the sole professional boxing body in Botswana. The association exists to regulate, sanction, license and safeguard the interest of professional boxers in the country.

PBAB is a member affiliate of the Botswana National Sport Commission effecting on November 2017. It is a sister corporate to international professional boxing bodies in terms of professional boxing rules and regulations.

PBAB EXECUTIVE MEETINGS

In accordance with the PBAB constitution executive meeting are held every month and I regret to inform the commission that the set target could not be met due to commitments by members and financial constraints, AND above all COVID-19 restrictions but managed to have at least 4 out of 12.

ORDINARY AND SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING

The association managed to hold one (1) special general meeting on 27 August 2020 however, were convened and the members could not make a quorum and resulted in cancelling the said meetings.

BNSC MEETINGS

All BNSC meetings and activities were honoured after being accepted in November 2017. We only have a challenge that our sitting allowances have never been paid despite several follow-ups on the same.

INVITATION TO CONVENTION OR TRIP OUTSIDE BOTSWANA

Due to the outbreak of COVID-19, we have not been able to attend to any invitations from other Boxing Organizations or bodies.

TOURNAMENT SANCTIONING AND TOURNAMENTS OUTSIDE BOTSWANA

Let me take this opportunity to applaud our local promoters in hosting the promotional tournament as well as taking boxers outside the country in an endeavour to promote professional boxing.

Allow me to report about the activities that took place from April 2018 to date.

- 1. On 27th November 2020 Scud Missile promotion in conjunction with WBF brought to this country a vacant WBF Featherweight title belt contested by Tshepang Babui from Botswana and Onkarabile Mothibedi of Botswana at Grand Palm Resort. As it was all locals the belt was retained by Onkarabile Mothibedi, who is the current belt contender. We had five successful fights on that night and only one could not take place due to COVID-19 positive tests by our boxera. Congratulations to our judges for exercising fair play.
- 2. Bond Boxing promotion hosted on 11th December 2020 at Botswana Craft and we were very unfortunate for most boxers to test positive for COVID-19 prior to the tournament and we only saw amateur boxers taking part on that night which had a GBV boxing awareness fight which featured two celebrities Losika and Robbie Rob.

I am confident to report that our boxer's performance in all the above tournaments was extremely impressive. We also noted that our medical procedure has assisted us in curbing the COVID-19 Spread within our sports as a whole.

Furthermore, our boxers continue to receive fight invitations from outside the country as we had one boxer, Gomotsang Gaasite, been invited to fight in Tanzania and despite having been cleared to travel we later decided to abandon the fight after our thorough research on the COVID-19 protocols and procedures in Tanzania.

Let me close this chapter by saying we need further indulgence with the relevant offices from the BNSC for a way forward on our future plans and guidance for our future tournaments and the mutual understanding of how Professional Boxing is administered for future purposes.

2020 was a very low key year because of the COVID-19 pandemic. There was very little happening as most of the time our athletes were kept at home by the Ministry of Basic Education. Our athletes, who have intellectual disabilities were and are still the last ones to be readmitted to schools after lockdowns, school holidays or following suspensions of classes due to the COVID-19 outbreak at schools. This kept athletes away from coaches, resulting in no activities taking place. The government further "closed" and suspended all sporting activities in the country.

PROGRESS SUMMARY AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

This year emphasis is on Unification and inclusiveness where the abilities of our athletes are paired with those from the mainstream. This is to aggressively address discrimination of people with disabilities as well as raise awareness of the abilities of our athletes.

However, not all was lost as we managed to train eight (8) athletes in leadership and mentoring. This was a great success as we collaborated with Women and Sport Botswana (WASBO) in pursuit of working together with other BNSC affiliates to better our NSA. In December, we also were able to participate and celebrate International disability day through sponsorship by United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). We selected 10 schools countrywide and at each school 20 athletes were to take part in the celebrations so that COVID-19 protocols could and should be strictly observed. Every athlete was also provided with cakes of soap to continue to wash their hands at home. Each school was provided with fitness cards that we asked two coaches to illustrate the exercises for the athletes. The FIT 5 cards were then given to each athlete to continue to exercise at home so as to be working on their fitness. There was also display cards depicting COVID-19 protocols as well as regular drinking of water. Throughout the "closures" and

lockdowns of schools, we encouraged coaches to go onto our International website and use the learning portal to train on various courses offered with certificates. The courses range from First aid, football, volleyball, administration, health etc. A total of 30 coaches were able to train and be certified in different qualifications. This was also encouraged by the ruling that only certified coaches will be allowed to participate at the next world games that will be held in Germany in June 2023. The coaches were advised to train in the sport codes that Special Olympics Botswana (SOB) currently offer. These are soccer, volleyball, swimming, athletics as some basic first aid and health courses.

Special Olympics International (SOI) and Special Olympics Africa (SOA), continued to offer financial support for athlete leadership training, where we train athletes to hold positions of responsibility in SB and at their own schools and regions. Both SOI and SOA offered virtual lessons throughout the year. They also have a bi-weekly zoom on COVID-19 updates, precautions and lessons from all over the world.

We continued to engage the Ministry of Basic Education for direct funding to SOB as almost all our athletes are school going pupils who are in Government inclusive schools countrywide., yet we don't get any funds from them for sports training and provision. We made a submitted to the task force team on School sports so that we are considered as a school sports entity like BISA and in particular BOPSSA. We remain hopeful for a favourable outcome and decision.

In June we partnered with UNFPA for awareness of COVID-19 where our athletes were on the Duma Radio talk show to sensitize our athletes on the dangers of COVID-19 and how to protect ourselves through following the protocols of social distancing, regular handwashing and wearing of masks.

The Sir Ketumile Masire Foundation also supported us by giving us cakes of soap which were given to some athletes to continue to wash their hands at home.

Two (2) Board member retreats were held to map out and plan for the year ahead as well as to start fundraising for the 2023 World games in Germany. A road map was adopted for further board training by SOA.

Some of our Athletes who participated in the 2019 World games, we're encouraged to build houses for themselves using incentives they received from MYSC. Glad, was the first one to build in Letlhakane. Others managed to get plots and were also to start building.

SUSTAINABLE FUNDRAISING

High-level talks continued with the Ministry of Basic Education for part funding from the Sports fund in relation to pupils with Intellectual Disabilities currently in Government Inclusive schools. We have also been vigorously approaching corporate for sponsorship but more specifically for partnership. We have thus far, partnered with Botswana Red Cross Society for continued First Aid training of athletes and coaches as well as being health providers at our games, (both Regional and National). We have partnered with UNFPA for supporting and training and awareness of sexual relationships among people with disabilities. Talks are at an advanced level now with UB for partnership and adoption of SOB so that they can offer us free usage of their facilities and also train our athletes. They will in turn use our athletes for further research and training.

Significant judgement is required in determining the value of Athlete's Village. Significant assumptions and judgements applied include the capitalisation rate, market value per square meter, build rate per square meter and rental amount.

We considered the valuation of the Athlete's Village to be a matter of most significance to the current year audit due to the significant judgements applied in the valuations as well as magnitude of the buildings balances.



ACCOUNTING POLICIES

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these annual financial statements are set out below.

1.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

The annual financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis in accordance with, and in compliance with, International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") and International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee ("IFRIC") interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these annual financial statements and the Act No. 30 of 2014.

The annual financial statements have been prepared on the historic cost convention, unless otherwise stated in the accounting policies which follow and incorporate the principal accounting policies set out below. They are presented in Pulas, which is the Commission's functional currency.

These accounting policies are consistent with the previous period.

1.2 SIGNIFICANT JUDGEMENTS AND SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of annual financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management, from time to time, to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. These estimates and associated assumptions are based on experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

Impairment of financial assets

The impairment provisions for financial assets are based on assumptions about the risk of default and expected loss rates. The Commission places judgment in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on the Commission's history, existing market conditions as well as forward-looking estimates at the end of each reporting period. For details of the key assumptions and inputs used, refer to the individual notes addressing financial assets.

Fair value estimation

Certain assets and liabilities of the Commission are either measured at fair value or disclosure is made of their fair values.

Observable market data is used as inputs to the extent that it is available. Qualified external valuers are consulted for the determination of appropriate valuation techniques and inputs.

Impairment testing

The Commission reviews and tests the carrying value of assets when events or changes in circumstances suggest that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. When such indicators exist, management determines the recoverable amount by performing value in use and fair value calculations. These calculations require the use of estimates and assumptions. When it is not possible to determine the recoverable amount for an individual asset, management assesses the recoverable amount for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Useful lives of property, plant and equipment

Management assesses the appropriateness of the useful lives of property, plant, and equipment at the end of each reporting period. The useful lives of motor vehicles, furniture, and computer equipment are determined based on the Commission's replacement policies for the various assets. Individual assets within these classes, which have a significant carrying amount are assessed separately to consider whether a replacement will be necessary outside of normal replacement parameters. The useful life of manufacturing equipment is assessed annually based on factors including wear and tear, technological obsolescence, and usage requirements.

When the estimated useful life of an asset differs from previous estimates, the change is applied prospectively in the determination of the depreciation charge.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.2 Significant judgements and sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

Provisions are inherently based on assumptions and estimates using the best information available.

1.3 INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the Commission, is classified as investment property. Investment property comprises car park and garden leased out. Investment property is measured initially at its cost, including related transaction costs.

After initial recognition, investment property is carried at fair value. Fair value is based on active market prices, adjusted, if necessary, for any difference in the nature, location or condition of the specific asset. If this information is not available, the Commission uses alternative valuation methods such as capitalization rate, market value per square meter, discount rate and rental amount. These valuations are reviewed annually by the members of the board.

The fair value of investment property reflects, among other things, rental income from current leases and assumptions about rental income from future leases in the light of current market conditions.

The fair value also reflects, on a similar basis, any cash outflows that could be expected in respect of the property. Subsequent expenditure is charged to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Commission and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Changes in fair values are recorded in the statement of comprehensive income.

If an investment property becomes owner-occupied, it is reclassified as property, plant and equipment, and its fair value at the date of reclassification becomes its cost for accounting purposes. Property that is being constructed or developed for future use as investment property is classified as investment property under construction and stated at cost until construction or development is complete.

If an item of property, plant and equipment becomes an investment property because its use has changed, any difference resulting between the carrying amount and the fair value of this item at the date of transfer is recognised in equity as a revaluation of property, plant and equipment under IAS 16. However, if a fair value gain reverses a previous impairment loss, the gain is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

1.4 PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets which the Commission holds for its own use and which are expected to be used for more than one year.

An item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Commission, and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment is initially measured at cost. Cost includes all of the expenditure which is directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the asset, including the capitalisation of borrowing costs on qualifying assets and adjustments in respect of hedge accounting, where appropriate.

Expenditure incurred subsequently for major services, additions to or replacements of parts of property, plant and equipment are capitalised if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Commission and the cost can be measured reliably. Day to day servicing costs are included in profit or loss in the year in which they are incurred.

Buildings are subsequently stated at revalued amount, being the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Revaluations are made with sufficient regularity such that the carrying amount does not differ materially from that which would be determined using fair value at the end of the reporting year.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.4 Property, plant and equipment (continued)

When an item of property, plant and equipment is revalued, the gross carrying amount is adjusted consistently with the revaluation of the carrying amount. The accumulated depreciation at that date is adjusted to equal the difference between the gross carrying amount and the carrying amount after taking into account accumulated impairment losses.

When an item of property, plant and equipment is revalued, any accumulated depreciation at the date of the revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset.

Any increase in an asset's carrying amount, as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the revaluation reserve in equity. The increase is recognised in surplus or deficit to the extent that it reverses a revaluation decrease of the same asset previously recognised in surplus or deficit.

Any decrease in an asset's carrying amount, as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in surplus or deficit in the current year. The decrease is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent of any credit balance existing in the revaluation reserve in respect of that asset. The decrease recognised in other comprehensive income reduces the amount accumulated in the revaluation reserve in equity.

The revaluation reserve related to a specific item of property, plant and equipment is transferred directly to retained income when the asset is derecognised.

Depreciation of an asset commences when the asset is available for use as intended by management. Depreciation is charged to write off the asset's carrying amount over its estimated useful life to its estimated residual value, using a method that best reflects the pattern in which the asset's economic benefits are consumed by the Commission. Leased assets are depreciated in a consistent manner over the shorter of their expected useful lives and the lease term. Depreciation is not charged to an asset if its estimated residual value exceeds or is equal to its carrying amount. Depreciation of an asset ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale or derecognised.

The useful lives of items of property, plant and equipment have been assessed as follows:

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of each asset are reviewed at the end of each reporting year. If the expectations differ from previous estimates, the change is accounted for prospectively as a change in accounting estimate.

The depreciation charge for each year is recognised in surplus or deficit unless it is included in the carrying amount of another asset

Impairment tests are performed on property, plant and equipment when there is an indicator that they may be impaired. When the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is assessed to be higher than the estimated recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit to bring the carrying amount in line with the recoverable amount.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its continued use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item, is included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognised.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.5 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial instruments held by the Commission are classified in accordance with the provisions of IFRS 9 Financial Instruments. Broadly, the classification possibilities, which are adopted by the Commission, as applicable, are as follows:

Financial assets which are equity instruments:

· Mandatorily at fair value through profit or loss; or

Financial assets which are debt instruments:

· Amortized cost.

Note 26 Financial instruments and risk management presents the financial instruments held by the Commission based on their specific classifications.

All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognized and derecognized on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

The specific accounting policies for the classification, recognition, and measurement of each type of financial instrument held by the Commission are presented below:

1.5 Financial instruments (continued)

Trade and other receivables

Classification

Trade and other receivables, excluding, when applicable, VAT and prepayments, are classified as financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost (note 5).

They have been classified in this manner because their contractual terms give rise, on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding, and the Commission's business model is to collect the contractual cash flows on trade and other receivables.

Recognition and measurement

Trade and other receivables are recognized when the Commission becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the receivables. They are measured, at initial recognition, at fair value plus transaction costs, if any.

They are subsequently measured at amortized cost.

The amortized cost is the amount recognized on the receivable initially, minus principal repayments, plus cumulative amortization (interest) using the effective interest method of any difference between the initial amount and the maturity amount, adjusted for any loss allowance.

Impairment

The Commission recognizes a loss allowance for expected credit losses on trade and other receivables, excluding VAT and prepayments. The amount of expected credit losses is updated at each reporting date.

The Commission measures the loss allowance for trade and other receivables at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses (lifetime ECL), which represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the receivable.

Measurement and recognition of expected credit losses

The Commission makes use of a provision matrix as a practical expedient to the determination of expected credit losses on trade and other receivables. The provision matrix is based on historic credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions, and an assessment of both the current and forecast direction of conditions at the reporting date, including the time value of money, where appropriate.

The customer base is widespread and does not show significantly different loss patterns for different customer segments. The loss allowance is calculated on a collective basis for all trade and other receivables in totality. Details of the provision matrix are presented in note 5.

An impairment gain or loss is recognized in profit or loss with a corresponding adjustment to the carrying amount of trade and other receivables, through the use of a loss allowance account. The impairment loss is included in other operating expenses in profit or loss as a movement in credit loss allowance (note 13).

Write off policy

The Commission writes off a receivable when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, e.g. when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings. Receivables written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Commission's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made are recognised in surplus or deficit.

Credit risk

Details of credit risk are included in the trade and other receivables note (note 5) and the financial instruments and risk management note (note 26).

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.5 Financial instruments (continued)

Derecognition

Refer to the derecognition section of the accounting policy for the policies and processes related to derecognition.

Trade and other payables

Classification

Trade and other payables (note 10), excluding VAT and amounts received in advance, are classified as financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Recognition and measurement

They are recognised when the Commission becomes a party to the contractual provisions, and are measured, at initial recognition, at fair value plus transaction costs, if any.

They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the amortised cost of a financial liability.

If trade and other payables contain a significant financing component, and the effective interest method results in the recognition of interest expense, then it is included in surplus or deficit in finance cost paid (note 22).

Trade and other payables expose the Commission to liquidity risk and possibly to interest rate risk. Refer to note 26 for details of risk exposure and management thereof.

Derecognition

Refer to the "derecognition" section of the accounting policy for the policies and processes related to derecognition.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are stated at carrying amount which is deemed to be fair value.

Bank overdrafts

Bank overdrafts are initially measured at fair value, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Derecognition

Financial assets

The Commission derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party. If the Commission neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Commission recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Commission retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Commission continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

Financial liabilities

The Commission derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Commission obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.5 Financial instruments (continued)

Reclassification

Financial assets

The Commission only reclassifies affected financial assets if there is a change in the business model for managing financial assets. If a reclassification is necessary, it is applied prospectively from the reclassification date. Any previously stated gains, losses or interest are not restated.

The reclassification date is the beginning of the first reporting period following the change in business model which necessitates a reclassification.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are not reclassified.

1.6 LEASES (COMPARATIVES UNDER IAS 17)

A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership. A lease is classified as an operating lease if it does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership.

Finance leases - lessee

Finance leases are recognised as assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position at amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the statement of financial position as a finance lease obligation.

The discount rate used in calculating the present value of the minimum lease payments is the interest rate implicit in the lease.

The lease payments are apportioned between the finance charge and reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance charge is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate on the remaining balance of the liability.

Operating leases - lessor

Operating lease income is recognised as an income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging operating leases are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised as an expense over the lease term on the same basis as the lease income.

Income for leases is disclosed under revenue in the statement of comprehensive income.

1.7 IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS

The Commission assesses at each end of the reporting period whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset.

Irrespective of whether there is any indication of impairment, the Commission also:

tests intangible assets with an indefinite useful life or intangible assets not yet available for use for impairment annually by comparing its carrying amount with its recoverable amount. This impairment test is performed during the annual period and at the same time every period.

If there is any indication that an asset may be impaired, the recoverable amount is estimated for the individual asset. If it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs is determined.

The recoverable amount of an asset or a cash-generating unit is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. If the recoverable amount of an asset is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. That reduction is an impairment loss.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.7 Impairment of assets (continued)

An impairment loss of assets carried at cost less any accumulated depreciation or amortisation is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease.

An entity assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that an impairment loss recognised in prior periods for assets other than goodwill may no longer exist or may have decreased. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amounts of those assets are estimated

The increased carrying amount of an asset other than goodwill attributable to a reversal of an impairment loss does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior periods.

A reversal of an impairment loss of assets carried at cost less accumulated depreciation or amortisation other than goodwill is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit. Any reversal of an impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation increase.

1.8 EQUITY

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities.

1.9 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Short-term employee benefits

The cost of short-term employee benefits, (those payable within 12 months after the service is rendered, such as paid vacation leave and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits such as medical care), are recognised in the period in which the service is rendered and are not discounted.

The expected cost of compensated absences is recognised as an expense as the employees render services that increase their entitlement or, in the case of non-accumulating absences, when the absence occurs.

The expected cost of surplus sharing and bonus payments is recognised as an expense when there is a legal or constructive obligation to make such payments as a result of past performance.

Defined contribution plans

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense as they fall due.

The Commission operates a contributory pension scheme for its employees, which provides for a pension based on the length of the service. The pension fund is a defined contribution fund managed by AON Botswana (Proprietary) Limited. Other than the regular contributions made in terms of the rules of the fund, the Commission does not have any further liability to the fund.

1.10 PROVISIONS AND CONTINGENCIES

Provisions are recognised when:

- · the Commission has a present obligation as a result of a past event;
- · it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
- a reliable estimate can be made of the obligation.

The amount of a provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation.

Where some or all of the expenditure required to settle a provision is expected to be reimbursed by another party, the reimbursement shall be recognised when, and only when, it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received if the entity settles the obligation. The reimbursement shall be treated as a separate asset. The amount recognised for the reimbursement shall not exceed the amount of the provision.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.10 Provisions and contingencies (continued)

If an entity has a contract that is onerous, the present obligation under the contract shall be recognised and measured as a provision.

A constructive obligation to restructure arises only when an entity:

- · has a detailed formal plan for the restructuring, identifying at least:
 - the business or part of a business concerned;
 - the principal locations affected;
 - the location, function, and approximate number of employees who will be compensated for terminating their

 - the expenditures that will be undertaken; and
 - when the plan will be implemented; and
- · has raised a valid expectation in those affected that it will carry out the restructuring by starting to implement that plan or announcing its main features to those affected by it.

After their initial recognition contingent liabilities recognised in business combinations that are recognised separately are subsequently measured at the higher of:

- · the amount that would be recognised as a provision; and
- the amount initially recognised less cumulative amortisation.

Contingent assets and contingent liabilities are not recognised.

1.11 GOVERNMENT GRANTS

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that:

- · the Commission will comply with the conditions attaching to them; and
- the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs that they are intended to compensate.

A government grant that becomes receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the entity with no future related costs is recognised as income of the period in which it becomes receivable.

Government grants related to assets, including non-monetary grants at fair value, are presented in the statement of financial position by setting up the grant as deferred income or by deducting the grant in arriving at the carrying amount of the asset.

1.12 OTHER OPERATING INCOME

The Commission recognises revenue from the following major sources:

· Stadia income-rentals and advertising.

Othe operating income is measured based on the consideration specified in a contract with a customer and excludes amounts collected on behalf of third parties. The Commission recognises revenue when it satisfies performance obligation by transferring services to a customer.

1.13 SPORTS DEVELOPMENT FUND

This fund is used to assist sports development, capacity building and to a reasonable extent, infrastructure development, Each year amounts are set aside from grants received at the discretion of the Board and contributions are sought from private sector as deemed necessary. Related costs are charged directly to this fund.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.14 TRANSLATION OF FOREIGN CURRENCIES

Foreign currency transactions

A foreign currency transaction is recorded, on initial recognition in Pulas, by applying to the foreign currency amount the spot exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction.

At the end of the reporting period:

- · foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate;
- non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction; and
- non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items or on translating monetary items at rates different from those at which they were translated on initial recognition during the period or in previous annual financial statements are recognised in surplus or deficit in the period in which they arise.

When a gain or loss on a non-monetary item is recognised to other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity, any exchange component of that gain or loss is recognised to other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity. When a gain or loss on a non-monetary item is recognised in surplus or deficit, any exchange component of that gain or loss is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Cash flows arising from transactions in a foreign currency are recorded in Pulas by applying to the foreign currency amount the exchange rate between the Pula and the foreign currency at the date of the cash flow.

Details of valuation

The revaluation for both Plot 25108 and Plot 25109 was performed on 31 March 2021. Revaluations were performed by an independent valuer, Benedict Kgosilentswe Bsc (Hons) Estate Management MRICS MREIB of Riberry (Pty) Ltd valuers who are not connected to the Commission and have recent experience in location and category of the investment property being valued.

The valuation was based on open market value for existing use. Since the there is no substantial change in the economic scenarios between the balance sheet date and the valuation date the Commission has adopted these values. Other Information

The Commission, vide fixed period state grant on 29/08/1973 for an indefinite period owns Lot 1864 measuring 106.7444 hectares. However, the Commission, in accordance with its Constitution and the objective of the Government of Botswana, has leased large portions of this land to various sporting bodies and affiliates through Notorial Deeds, each of which give the affiliates right to use and develop the land for sporting purposes and ancillary activities. Based on the substance over form, the land so leased out to affiliates are not treated as investment property as there is neither an intent to hold these land for capital appreciation or earn market rentals. However, the Commission receives rental income from certain affiliates which are below market rates



Exposure to credit risk

Trade receivables inherently expose the Commission to credit risk, being the risk that the Commission will incur financial loss if customers fail to make payments as they fall due.

A loss allowance is recognised for all trade receivables, in accordance with IFRS 9 Financial Instruments, and is monitored at the end of each reporting period. In addition to the loss allowance, trade receivables are written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovery, for example, when a debtor has been placed under liquidation. Trade receivables which have been written off are not subject to enforcement activities.

The Commission measures the loss allowance for trade receivables by applying the simplified approach which is prescribed by IFRS 9. In accordance with this approach, the loss allowance on trade receivables is determined as the lifetime expected credit losses on trade receivables. These lifetime expected credit losses are estimated using a provision matrix, which is presented below. The provision matrix has been developed by making use of past default experience of debtors but also incorporates forward looking information and general economic conditions of the industry as at the reporting date.

There has been no change in the estimation techniques or significant assumptions made during the current reporting period.

The Commission's historical credit loss experience does not show significantly different loss patterns for different customer segments. The provision for credit losses is therefore based on past due status without disaggregating into further risk profiles. The loss allowance provision is determined as follows:

28. Covid-19 statement

In early January 2020, a viral infection originating in China was traced to a novel strain of the corona virus. The virus has subsequently spread to other parts of the world including the U.S., Europe and Africa and has caused unprecedented disruptions in the global economy as efforts to contain the spread of the virus intensified. On 11 March 2020 the World Health Organisation officially declared this corona virus outbreak (also referred to as COVID- 19) as a pandemic.

The coronavirus outbreak and corresponding new government mandates may have a continued adverse effect on economic and financial market conditions and trigger a period of global economic slowdown. Management has not recorded any financial impact from this event to the financial statements as of 31 March 2021. Management has monitored developments relating to the coronavirus and successfully executed its operational response based on existing business continuity plans to manage the operations. Management has also followed guidance from global health organizations and relevant government and regulatory authorities, especially with regard to the safety of its employees and efforts to contain the spread of the virus.

The Commission's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent on a number of factors. Management is of the view that the Commission will be able to continue its operations at least until the end of the next financial year.

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of accounting policies applicable to a going concern. This basis presumes that the funds will be available to finance future operations and that the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities, contingent obligations and commitments will occur in the ordinary course of business.

There were no other post balance sheet events which require adjustment or disclosure in these financial statements.

29. Region 5 Youth Games Legacy project

Region 5 Youth Games Legacy Project relates to the Indoor Hall project to be undertaken by the Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sport and Culture Development. The Commission is tasked to manage the Project on behalf of the Ministry and ensure its successful delivery. The amount transferred during the year and as at 31 March 2021 amounted to P 3,539,832.
